Library Needs Funds For Building Repair

Organizations and groups throughout Centre County are asked to keep in mind the Centre County Library when budgeting funds for charitable purposes.

The library currently is setting up a fund to be used after the war in painting and repairing the exterior woodwork of the building. The work will not be attempted until after the war because of the shortage of labor and materials.

The first contribution to the fund was made several weeks ago by the Bellefonte Mothers Club, which voted an appropriation of \$100 to the library. It is estimated that repairs to the building will require from \$700 to \$800, so that additional contributions will be appreciated.

INSURANCE AVAILABLE FOR ALL FARM WORKERS

Although Pennsylvania law does not compel farmers to protect either themselves or their workers, many Centre County farmers have been inquiring whether policies are available and advisable, reports the County agent, R. C. Blaney.

From the farmer's standpoint, he can get workmen's compensation if he chooses, or can take out liability policies with private companies as protection against possible accidents or lawsuits.

The hauling of workers on trucks or in automobiles is covered in some policies, while other policies are limited. To be on the safe side, County Agent Blaney suggests that farmers write to their own insurance companies and get specific rulings on such matters for their own protection.

Youths and seasonal workers can get accident and medical expense policies, if they choose, that are in effect 24 hours a day, whether they are working or playing. These policies can be taken out by the workers if they desire, as extra financial protection against any conditions which may arise.

Full details on policies, insurance for farm labor, and liability protection can be obtained from the county agent's office in the Postoffice building, Bellefonte, or from the Emergency Farm Labor office, Farmers National Bank building.
