SOCIAL SECURITY Agent to be Here

Where monthly benefits are not payable, lump-sum claims may be paid upon the death of insured workers.

"All payments, monthly or lump-sum, hinge upon the insured status of the worker, his average monthly wage and the time he spends in covered employment. "It was explained that the representative not only will handle applications for benefits, but will render services and assistance to those applicants who need it. "We invite all people desiring information or assistance in Social Security matters to come to us. We want to be of real service to the people of Bellefonte and Centre county," said Mr. Teasdale.
