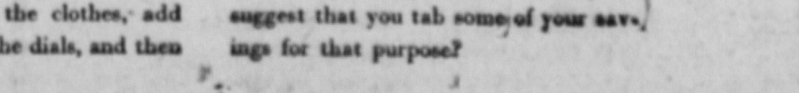

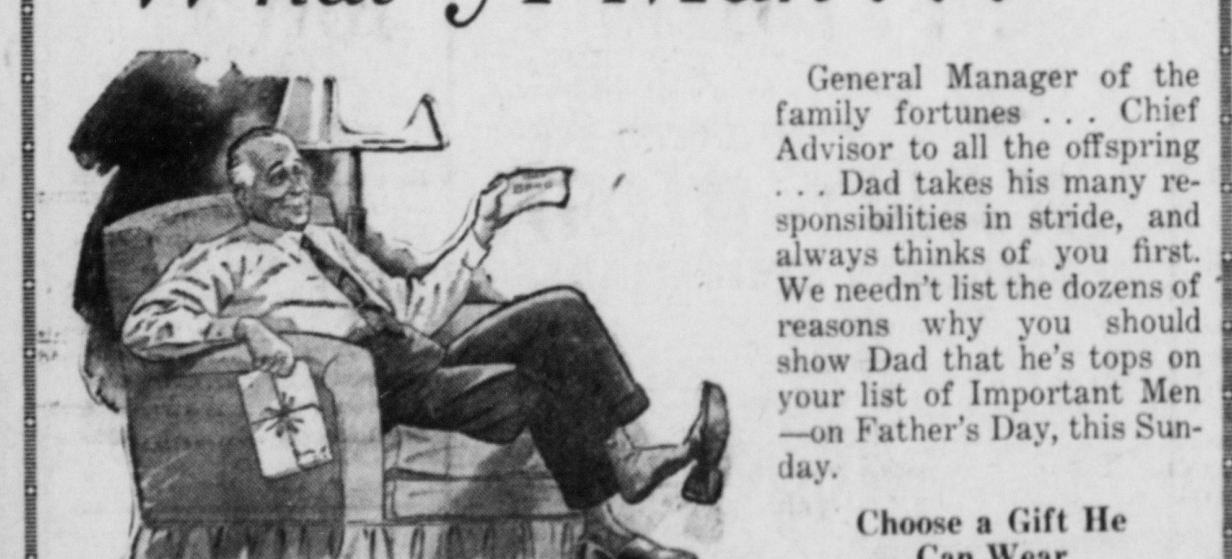
In addition to the automatic washing machine and a lightweight automatic electric iron, the modern home laundry will contain an electric
