Paul Campbell, of State College as chairman, and which in the past two campaigns has been responsible for the sale of approximately \$250,000 in bonds, has been prepared for an especially intensive drive in the 5th War Loan campaign. The committee consists of Harry M. Smith, of Spring township; Mrs. Samuel Grove, of Potter township; Harry Fisher, of Hillmont township, and John W. Decker, of Gering township. Mr. Campbell announced yesterday that chairman and solicitors for each of the county's townships have been named and the lists are expected to be released for publication within a few days. Centre county's goal in the drive, which concludes July 2, is \$2,238,000—the largest assignment ever to be given to the county. Everyone selling 10 bonds of any denomination to 10 different people is entitled to have a serviceman's name listed on the Roll of Honor, a special feature of the Fifth War Loan drive. Mrs. Amos Neyhart, of State College, county chairman, reports. No special application is needed, the chairman said. The number "2" perforated section of the application for issuance of the bond should be filled in with the name of the serviceman woman and credit will be given. The person selling the bond is then a member of the Roll of Honor League. No more than one name will be inscribed on the Roll of Honor for members of the league, except in the case of mothers who, selling 10 or more War Bonds, may have the names of all her sons or daughters in the service inscribed. Names of boys from Port Matilda, Lemont, Pine Grove Mills and Boalsburg will be inscribed on the Roll of Honor which will be displayed at a prominent place in State College. Other communities of the county will have their own Roll of Honor with their organization and activities to be announced later. Further information on the Roll of Honor League may be obtained from headquarters at the Service Centre, 108 W. College avenue, State College. The birds then built a second nest at the foot of Phoenix avenue, located near the junction of Spring Creek and Logan Branch, and directly across the creek from the No. 2 warehouse on the Hillside Hardware store on South Potter street. Four more eggs were deposited, and again hatching was resumed. But high water several weeks ago reached the nest and the swans, after the water receded, apparently decided that at least two of the eggs had been ruined. Anyway, a resident of the vicinity saw the swans roll two eggs out of the nest and break them. Since then a third egg has disappeared, leaving only one in the nest. The nest is located in the center of a small field extending down to the water's edge. It is built of sticks, straw, leaves and reeds and is about three feet in diameter. It seems to be about a foot in height, and the inside of the nest is quite shallow. The egg is of a dark greenish-brown shade and measures approximately five inches long by four inches in diameter. Hope for the hatching of the solitary egg is held by some persons who contend that if the swans broke several of the other eggs apparently because they weren't going to hatch, they should be able to know whether the remaining egg will be a success. We're rooting for the lone egg. We hope it turns into a cygnet (young swan), so that the cob (male swan) and the pen (female swan) can cruise proudly up and down Spring Creek along Water street this summer to show off their family.
