Sterling Barrett Burd, four-year-old son of Mrs. Palmer Bierly, of Rebersburg, died at 6:30 a. m. Saturday, June 17, 1944, at the home of his mother. The child had not been well since undergoing a brain tumor operation in a Philadelphia hospital last winter. The child was born January 17, 1940 in Rebersburg. In addition to the mother, a half-brother, Roger Allen Bierly, survives. Funeral services were held at the home Tuesday afternoon and interment was made in the Askey cemetery near Moshannon.

Zoning Law Will Affect Entire Town

For example, in the First Residential Zone, lots must meet certain size requirements. There are regulations to control the type and position of buildings erected on them and other controls are given broad powers and is authorized to institute proceedings or legal action to enforce compliance with the law.

In the event a citizen is dissatisfied with the ruling of the Board of Adjustment, he is entitled to file an appeal in the Court of Common Pleas.

Penalties for violations of the law are a fine of not more than \$100 nor less than \$10, and costs, or not more than 30 days in jail, or both, at the discretion of the Justice of the Peace or Burgess imposing sentence. Each day that a violation is permitted to exist after notice in writing shall have been served by the Building Inspector, constitutes a separate offense.

The importance of the ordinance to the citizens of town cannot be over-emphasized. Without knowledge of its provisions it is entirely possible for a person to proceed with plans for founding a business, building a home, remodeling a present structure, only to find that his plans may be illegal under the new laws.

So again it is urged that the law be studied carefully and then be filed safely away for possible future use.

collection efforts in 1925, and that despite numerous collectors, purchased and installed, the overall condition has not improved to any appreciable extent.

To support its contentions, the committee brought into the Council chambers exhibits which members claimed showed the detrimental effect of lime dust on roofing and paint. One sample of roofing which was guaranteed for 25 years and which has been used ten years, appeared to be badly eaten away.

Approval was given of an expenditure of \$50 from the Borough Civilian Defense Fund for defraying some expenditures for the Bellefonte Canning Center, located in the High School cafeteria.
