William Ford, 31, of El Paso, Texas, a cousin of the Beezer, McGowan and Armorer families of Bellefonte, who died on the third anniversary of his ordination. Father Ford, whose mother was the former Ellie Beezer, of Spring Creek, died at a hospital near Chicago, after two years' illness. Interment took place in the Priests' cemetery on the grounds of Notre Dame University, South Bend, Ind. Father Ford, who visited in Bellefonte several years ago, was educated for the priesthood at Catholic University, Washington, D. C. P. S.: After reading over this column, this corner suspects you'd better go out and buy a halo. Or else get a nice conservative black outfit and go into the reforming business on a big scale.

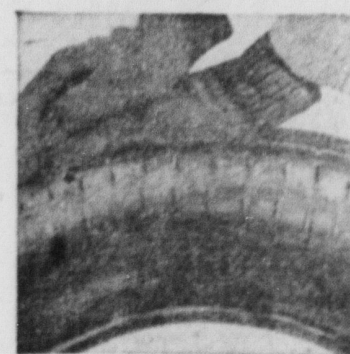
