Tyrone Youth Killed In European War

Staff Sergeant Thomas J. Lane, son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas J. Lane, Tyrone, who joined the army February 8, 1941, has been killed in

action, according to a war department telegram which said his death occurred June 8 in the European theatre of operations. There is believed, though nothing official, that Sergeant Lane was killed during the invasion fighting.

Sergeant Lane was born on September 29, 1919, in Tyrone, a son of

Thomas J. and Martha (Miles) Lane. On September 29, 1943, in Cheltenham, Eng., he was united in marriage with a young English lady, Miss Hazel Newman, of Cheltenham. He is survived by his wife, his parents and two sisters, Mrs. Claude M. Scales, at home, and Mrs. Louis Blair, of Washington, D. C.

West Penn Employes Hold War Bond Rally

A. J. Lohs, of Pittsburgh, chairman of the West Penn System War Bond committee, was principal speaker at a bond rally for local West Penn employes held Tuesday at the American Legion Home on East Howard street, with 55 employes present. Mr. Lohs' strong plea for the purchase of more bonds during the 5th War Loan drive was answered by a report showing that Bellefonte and State College employes have subscribed one hundred per cent of the quota set for them by the county for extra bond purchases. The employes also are signed up on bond deductions per cent for payroll deductions.

After the showing of a motion picture of the U. S. attack and capture of islands in the Marshall group, Pvt. Harry E. Joubert, of the First Ranger Battalion, related some of his experiences in engagements in which he participated in North Africa, Sicily, Salerno, Tunisia, Cassino and on the Anzio beachhead. Pvt. Joubert was twice wounded, has been awarded the Purple Heart, and has pre-Pearl Harbor, Veteran of Foreign Service, American Theatre of War, and European Theatre of War service ribbons. He is now at Doshon Army Hospital, Butler, recuperating from his wounds.

Howard Couple Hear From Son in England

According to M. Egt. H. J. Kline, who is somewhere in England, he is kept busy with others, in pushing along the invasion. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Kline, of Howard, recently received the following letter from their son:

"Dear Mother, Dad and Junior: I do not know just how you are receiving my mail. Understand there may be some delay for a while since the invasion has started. I know you are all wondering where I am, but there has been no change. We are still at the same place and very busy sending little packages for the Krauts. Had to laugh—some German prisoners were on a train that stopped at a station. A bystander asked one what he thought of England. He replied: "Der Fuehrer promised us three years ago we would get to England—here we are." They didn't figure being prisoners, though.

"They are having lousy weather for the invasion. Cloudy and raining since it started. Just so it goes well and we all get home soon. Everything is good here. Work every day and time sure flies around. Hope you are all O. K. Love, HAROLD.
