

OBITUARY

MOSE JOHNSTON

Death came suddenly to Mose Johnston, a prominent Democrat of Phillipsburg, Saturday night, June 24, 1944, at 10:35 o'clock at the Phillipsburg State Hospital as the result of a cerebral hemorrhage. He became ill that morning and was taken to the hospital in the afternoon. Mr. Johnston was born in Old Philadelphia, North Wales, on May 3, 1875, and came to this country at the age of six years with his parents, Alfred and Mary Westmoreland Johnston. They settled in Phillipsburg on September 4, 1893. Mr. Johnston married Mary Ellen Lamb, and they began housekeeping in Phillipsburg. Mrs. Johnston preceded her husband in death twelve years ago on November 22nd last. The following children survive: Alfred and Thomas, of Phillipsburg; Esther, who resided with her father on Seventh street; Violet, wife of Frank Brumbaugh; Pvt. Irvin (Mose) Johnston, of Camp Crowder, Missouri; Brothers and sisters surviving are: George, of Phillipsburg; Alfred, of Harrisburg; William, Thomas, Dorsey and Joseph Johnston; Mrs. William Rapey, Mrs. Jack Voyce, both of Phillipsburg; Mrs. John Condon, of Ohio; Misses Geraldine and Ruth Johnston, at home; Mr. Johnston followed the coal business until his retirement several years ago. He was a member of St. Paul's Episcopal church and a charter member of the Phillipsburg chapter, Loyal Order of Moose. He was assessor for Third Ward. He was a lifelong and staunch member of the Democratic party. Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at St. Paul's Episcopal church in charge of the Rev. Harvey P. Knudsen, B.D., with burial in the Phillipsburg cemetery.

JOHN CHARLES TAYLOR

Funeral services were held at his late home on Reynolds avenue, Bellefonte, Monday afternoon for John Charles Taylor, 21, former member of Battery B, of Bellefonte, who died at 6:18 p. m. Saturday, June 24, 1944, at the Centre County Hospital. Rev. Clarence E. Arnold, pastor of the Lutheran church, and Rev. H. H. Jacobs, pastor of the Evangelical church, officiated. Military services in charge of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion, both of Bellefonte, were held at the grave at Zion cemetery. Members of the Marching Unit of the Undine Fire Company served as pallbearers. The young man, who had been suffering from diabetes, became ill last Thursday afternoon and the following day was taken to the Centre County

Hospital. The former soldier, who was employed for the past 18 months as a clerk in the offices of the Universal Match Company, Bellefonte, left with former Battery B in February, 1941, and after training for 11 months at Camp Shelby, Miss., was given an honorable discharge. He was a member of the marching unit of the Undine Fire Company and appeared in the Memorial Day and Flag Day parades this year. He was Bellefonte reporter of "Universal Tips," match company publication, and was captain of a bowling team in Bellefonte. John C. Taylor was born in Huntingdon, April 24, 1923, a son of Harold E. and Susan Fleck Taylor. His mother, Mrs. J. Linn Blackford; his step-father, Mr. Blackford, and a step-brother and step-sister, survive. They are Sandra and Donald Blackford, all of Bellefonte.

MRS. ALICE WINTON

Mrs. Alice Winton, of South Spring street, Bellefonte, died at 1:30 p. m. Friday, June 23, 1944, at the County Home where she was admitted last December. Mrs. Winton, who had been bedfast there most of that time, was the widow of Harry Winton, former Bellefonte coal dealer and railroad conductor. She was in her early 70's. Born at the Forge near Bellefonte, she was a daughter of William and Sarah Saylor. Y. Funeral services were held at the Widdowson funeral home Monday afternoon, with interment in Union cemetery, Bellefonte.

Lawrence M. Conaway, retired section foreman of Karthaus, father of Mrs. W. W. Confer of Howard, died at 10:30 a. m. Friday, June 24, 1944, while at his work as a time keeper on a coal stripping job at New Garden, West Keating township, Clinton county. Mr. Conaway died of aneurysm pectoris while walking in the woods with Ira Viehdorfer of Snow Shoe. He was 62. The deceased had been employed as a foreman by the Pennsylvania Railroad for 29 years until retiring a few years ago. Many years ago he lived at Munson. He was a member of St. Mary's Catholic church of Frenchville. Born at Frenchville, April 4, 1882, he was a son of Miles and Catherine Flood

Conaway. His wife died nine years ago. In addition to Mrs. Confer, the following children survive: Glenn and Clair, of Niagara Falls, N. Y.; Capt. Iona, of the WAC's stationed in Utah; Lillian and Louise, of Erie; Mrs. Aloysius Liesey of Karthaus, and Marie, at home.
