Funeral services were held at his late home Friday morning with Dr. L. J. Beebe, pastor of Spruce Creek Presbyterian church in charge. Interment was made in the Gatesburg cemetery.

JOSEPH W. RILEY

Joseph W. Riley, well known resident of Osceola Mills for nearly 60 years, died at his home in that place Thursday morning, July 6, of a sudden heart attack. He had been ailing for five weeks, but seemingly was recovering from his illness. The deceased was born in Scotland on January 10, 1880, a son of James Riley and Mary Crawford Riley. He came to this country with his parents at the age of five years. All his life was lived in the vicinity in which he died. He is the last of his generation. Surviving along with his wife, the former Agnes Hughes, whom he married on June 20, 1907, are the following son and daughters: Lieutenant James R. Riley, who is with the American forces in Australia; Mrs. F. J. Boerger, of Philadelphia; Mrs. F. D. Kloosker, Catherine and Betty Riley, all of Erie. Lieutenant Clare Riley, a daughter, was killed while on duty in North Africa on July 1, 1943. Mr. Riley had been associated in the coal business practically all his life in the vicinity of Osceola Mills. He was a member of the Immaculate Conception church and Loyal Order of Moose. Funeral services were held Monday morning at 10 o'clock in charge of the Rev. L. J. Kelly, with interment in the church cemetery.

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said Herman Wallenda, "but people were so crowded there that we saw we didn't have a chance. So we climbed over the cage that lined the exit. That was easy for us—we were performers. But the public couldn't get out that way."

Started as Small Blaze

The fire was described as only a small blaze when it started, and could have been put out with a pail of water. Suddenly the little flame that started in the sidewalk about 75 feet from the entrance, spread awfully fast, right up to the top. The tent, it was said, went up like a puff of smoke and within ten minutes lay like a mass of burnt paper. Many were killed and injured in the rush for the exits which came even as the band began playing to allay the fears of the thousands inside the big top. One spectator said, "I saw rows of charred bodies lying between the burned bleachers. They showed no evidence of being trampled on, but were scorched and burned. The heat was intense. Men were crying for their children. There was a terrible howling and screeching and panic."

Circus Officials Arrested

As a result of the disaster a number of the circus executives and employes have been arrested, pending an official investigation of the report that the big tent had been treated with a preparation of paraffin thinned with gasoline to render it rain-resistant. The owners declared they have cancelled all future show dates and will move the circus to winter quarters at Sarasota, Florida.
