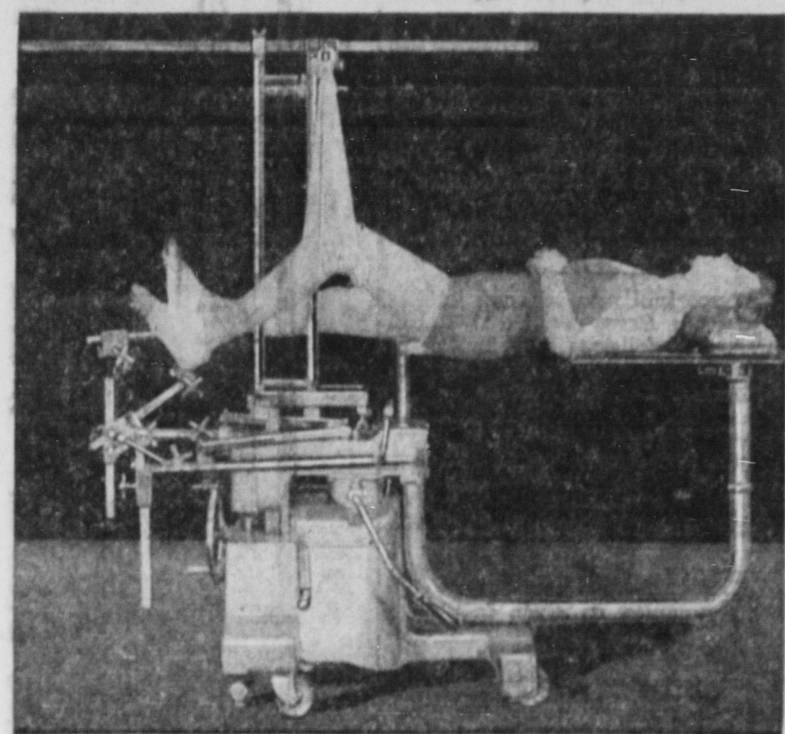
Bellefonte Man Involved in Crash

Above is the fracture table recently added to the equipment of the Centre County Hospital, Bellefonte. This device was designed by Dr. Adrian Comper of the Comper Division of the American Sterilizer Co. of Erie, and can be used in reducing all types of fractures. It also is indispensable in applying casts to fractured limbs, making it unnecessary for attendants to hold limbs in set positions while the cast material is being applied. The fracture table was purchased by the Titan Metal Manufacturing Company at a cost of approximately \$1,000 and was given to the hospital, for the benefit of all citizens of Centre County. Local Dentist In Fighting on Saipan

Following is a Marine correspondent's account of part of the invasion of Saipan Island in which Lt. Donald Flegal, Bellefonte dentist, took a prominent part.

"The amphibious tractor just ahead of us had been hit by mortar fire and our driver didn't want to make a landing on Saipan. However, Lieutenant Donald L. Flegal, Navy dentist from Bellefonte, Pa., attached to the Marine Corps, said he had to get his first aid men and some blood plasma on that beach, so the driver went in.

"The landing was made safely, though under heavy fire, and it was plain that medical assistance was needed. Lieutenant Flegal attempted to find the unit to which he and his men were to report, but in the rain of explosives, no one knew where it was.

"After seeing that the men on the beach were cared for, Lieutenant Flegal proceeded inland with Pharmacist's Mate 3 c Alva R. Layton, Lincoln, Neb., and Pharmacist's Mate 2 c Marshall D. Stralowitz, Dorchester, Mass. They were passing through an artillery unit when a mortar barrage was laid on the position and an artilleryman right next to the dentist was killed.

"For almost 20 hours thereafter, Lieutenant Flegal and his assistants endured the heaviest kind of artillery barrage, attending men who were lucky that they were alive. Flegal came separated and was feared lost, but turned up four or five hours later working in a nearby outfit.

"Ultimately, Lieutenant Flegal was able to make contact with his outfit by radio and was ordered back—a trip made under sniper and artillery fire.

"In combat areas, dentists attached to the Marine Corps act as doctor's assistants and first aid men."

'Tick Fever' Case Is Reported Here

Hospital care is recommended as the best treatment for human beings bitten by a tick. As first aid, physicians say that after the tick is removed—with gloved fingers or pin-cers, or with the edge of a card or stiff piece of paper—a toothpick dipped in iodine should be pushed into the tiny hole made by the insect. Turpentine or other antiseptics will do just as well.

The tick should be saved so that it may be identified by some competent authority. After that early treatment is the best assurance of recovery. Physicians report that the death rate for the entire country runs to 18 per cent, including the deadly Western type.

The ticks are easily recognizable as flat, oval shaped insects, reddish brown, a quarter of an inch long and having eight legs arranged like those of a crab. As a precaution medical men advise that owners of dogs treat them once a week with ground derrin powder to prevent the ticks from attaching themselves to the animals. When this is not done the dogs should be examined every four days and the ticks carefully removed and destroyed.

When the victim does not recognize the tick bite in time and the spotted fever develops, he may think he has the measles. Severe chills and pains rack the bones, joints and muscles as the first symptoms. The rash follows in about three days.

The fever may continue for two weeks or three weeks. It is often accom-
