Mrs. Jennie O. Sharer, of Centre Hall, died suddenly at 4 p. m. Saturday, July 8, 1944, at her home a few minutes after suffering a heart attack. ## County Exceeds War Bond Quota

Victory booth in Howard last week were \$1,633.25, or a total for the last two weeks of \$3,497.45. The booth was manned by star mothers and wives. In addition 22 block leaders in Howard conducted the most complete canvass in that area of any War Loan campaign to date. Centre county set another record during the drive. It was revealed late yesterday. Of the 17 central Pennsylvania counties comprising the Keystone division, Centre is the only one with every industry participating in the Payroll Savings Plan. There are 35 industries in the county and employes of all of them have instituted payroll deductions for the purchase of War Bonds. The report notes, however, that some improvement can be made, for a total of 2,998 employes of the industries, 1,125 are not participants of payroll deductions. The Phillipsburg district, of which John Lux is chairman, had a total quota of \$529,000 and sales to date total \$586,327.25. It was announced yesterday. The total quota was broken down into \$229,000 in E bonds; \$160,000 for other bonds to individuals, and \$146,000 for corporations. Sales were: \$182,000 in E bonds; \$171,144 in other individuals, and \$322,803 to corporations. Figures for State College and Snow Shoe districts, which also exceeded their quotas, were not available yesterday.

Industries and employes of industries responded with their usual fine cooperation during the 9th War Loan campaign. It was announced yesterday by the Industrial Committee, of which Horace J. Hartman of Bellefonte, is chairman, and with W. W. Elzig and John Curtin, Jr., of Bellefonte, and Thomas J. Lee of Phillipsburg, as members.

## Fortress Gunner Missing In Action

He was among the first group of flyers at a Flying Fortress base in England to be decorated with the Air Medal for bombing missions which included attacks in support of Allied Expeditionary troops in Normandy. He was presented the medal for "exceptionally meritorious achievements in accomplishing with distinction heavy bombardment missions against enemy-occupied Europe."

The county gunner enlisted in the Army Air Forces in July, 1942, at State College and was called about six months later to begin training. He trained at air fields in Tennessee, the Bombardier School at Las Vegas, Nev., Salt Lake City, Utah, Sioux City, Iowa, Kearney, Kansas, and left from an embarkation center in Maine in February of this year for overseas.
