And if you could just see the stuff coming by us, stuff that you have helped build, you would be mighty proud. It is almost unbelievable. I read in the paper where, in a recent month nearly 10,000 war planes were built. So fellows, from the bottoms of our hearts we all feel proud of your magnificent war work. It will soon start to pay dividends. The boys on the other side will take care of the Germans and those out here the Japs, and then America can settle down and her people be happy again.

There is nothing here on the island but a few coconut trees and sand. Not a blade of grass or a flower. We take our baths in the Pacific and wash our clothes in home-made washing machines. Have movies quite often.

In all probability we will move again soon. Destination unknown. But we are hoping for a rest period. Would like to be remembered to all the boys who have left the plant, so if any of you are writing them soon, please give them my regards. I know you fathers with boys in the service are writing them often.

Just found out we are having ice cream for dinner so I'll have to close now and get in line. Best of luck to you all. May God bless you and hurry the day when we will all be working together in the lime and limestone again. Always, JOHN.

A second letter written by Seaman Smith was received by one of the plant executives. It follows: Sunday evening, July 2, 1944.

Your fine letter of May 21st just arrived about an hour ago. It must have been lost. Sure had a long time to get here. It was appreciated so much. Thanks a million.

Have been fine. Get a little blue at times but guess that is just natural. I am at the island yet. Expect to move soon, probably nearer Tojo. We have been out now for almost eight months and are pretty tired. I'll explain the difference why we are tired out so soon. We have really worked hard and conditions at times were not too good. Plenty hot. We work stripped to the waist, so you know I am plenty brown. This morning in church I was soaking wet. An officer from a ship sang, "Nearer My God to Thee." He had a wonderful tenor voice and it was swell.

Commander Eddie Peabody had an all-male all-Navv USO show here. John Stewart, the Met. Opera singer, was with him. Then Claude Thornhill (chief) had a group here. They were all very good. Have movies out under the skies and we are really air conditioned there. Frequently liquid cooled during the show. Rains are usually cold.

War does something to one that is hard to explain. Once I get my feet on good old U. S. A. soil I'm going to try and forget this stuff. Germany should fold by fall, then with a little aid this Pacific war should wind up in six months more. The Japs are far from licked but we haven't started right yet either. Wish I could tell you what is going on right now. Beautiful sights, believe me.

Plan to Organize Nurses Aid Course

Miss Lillian Garbrick and Miss Margaret Brockerhoff have just announced that plans are under way for the organization of a nurses' aid course authorized by the American Red Cross and sponsored by the Bellefonte and State College chapters.

In January of this year 17 aides were graduated and have been working at the Centre County Hospital, contributing more than 2000 hours of service.

Applicants for training must be Americans or friendly aliens between 18 and 50 years of age, have a high school education or its equivalent, and be willing to serve without pay at least 300 hours each year. Certain physical requirements must be met.

The course is divided into two units and must be taught by a registered nurse authorized by American Red Cross. A unit of 35 hours will be devoted to lectures and demonstrations of simple nursing procedure. Another unit of 45 hours will consist of supervised practice in the wards of the Centre County Hospital.

Pleads Guilty to Drunken Driving

F. L. Randolph, of Pine Grove Mills, entering a plea of guilty to a drunken driving charge at a special session of court here Monday morning was sentenced by Judge Ivan Walker to pay the costs of prosecution and undergo imprisonment in the county jail for a period of 60 days.

Howard Hancock, of the State Motor Police at Pleasant Gap, prosecutor in the case, told the court that Randolph was arrested on Route 220 in Huston township on June 16 after his car had been observed proceeding in a zigzag fashion along the highway. The officer said the driver ignored two orders to halt before finally bringing his car to a stop.

Pvt. Hancock testified that Randolph became abusive in his language and that an odor of alcohol was apparent. Since no physician was available in Port Matilda, he was taken before Justice of the Peace Stiver where he entered a plea of guilty to drunken driving and was released on bail.

Randolph appeared in court here twice in 1939 on similar charges, but since that time has had a clear record. This factor was taken into consideration in determining the sentence on the present charge, Judge Walker declared.

Boro Garbage Agency Reports 11-cent Profit

The Bellefonte borough garbage collection system, instituted some months ago to fill in for a wartime shortage of private agencies, submitted a two-month report to Council, Monday night, for the period from May 13 to July 13.

The report showed that the agency, which was set up to operate on a cost instead of a profit basis, came mighty near making a 100 per cent profit.

For the 71 customers of the service, the report showed, receipts were \$159.39 and expenses were \$159.28.

The agency met its costs with 11 cents to spare!

The youth is believed to have leaped against the handle of the car door, releasing the catch, the accident happening on the hill just south of town.

He was brought to the Centre County Hospital where he was found to be suffering from a laceration of the scalp, and brush burns and bruises of the face, hands, and arms. His condition at the hospital yesterday was reported to be satisfactory.

The boy's mother is the former Dorothy Knisely, daughter of Police Officer Albert Knisely, of Bellefonte.
