work and, if necessary, will place liens against properties for the cost of the work.

This action was taken when the Sanitary Committee reported they had investigated complaints that cesspools at the properties have been giving trouble on numerous occasions. The properties involved in the order are those of Miller Shawley, Bruce Wilson and George Kellerman.

The police report submitted by Officer Albert Knisely revealed the following activities from July 3 to 17: 111 cars tagged, 1 larceny investigation, 1 accident investigation, 2 transients lodged in the lock-up, 5 confidential reports, \$210.46 from parking meters, and \$48.60 from market fees.

At the request of employees of the Borough and Water Departments, Council ruled that any person who has been continuously employed by the borough for two years as of July 1, 1944, shall be granted a week's vacation with pay. The order includes borough employees whose period of employment has been interrupted by military service.

The Water Committee noted collections totaling \$2,054.69; the Fire and Police Committee reported 55 parking meter violations and fines totaling \$30.50; it was recommended that street and traffic signs be repainted and repaired where necessary, and Council ruled that the borough dog law enforcement officer henceforth will be answerable only to the Special Committee. The latter action was taken to clear confusion existing in the matter of authority over the dog law office.
