(Continued from page one) truck in operating condition, had driven it to the barracks there. Deputy Rhoads said a careful check of the report that two men had been seen fleeing from the truck into the dense woods nearby was made and that the report was in error. There was no identification whatever that the pair had been seen in the vicinity, the officials said. The abandoned machine, a 1941 Chevrolet three-quarter ton pickup, was brought back to Rockview late Sunday night. Goodwin is 5 feet 6 inches tall, weighs about 132 pounds, is of medium slender build and has brown hair and brown eyes. He has a speech impediment and nervous disposition and bears scars and tattoo marks on both hands and arms. He was sentenced from Fayette county for a term of from 7 to 25 years for robbery and larceny and was transferred to Rockview in September, 1943. Aldrich is 5 feet 5 inches tall, weighs about 147 pounds, is of medium build, has brown eyes and dark brown hair, and is partly bald in front. He was sentenced from Crawford county for 6 to 20 years on a robbery charge, and was sent to Rockview in August, 1942. The escape is the first since April 29 when Steve Pushkar, a night watchman, walked away from his work at the feed mill.

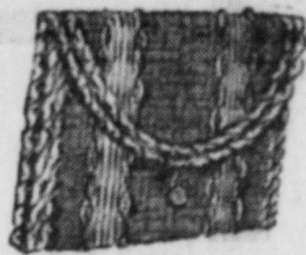

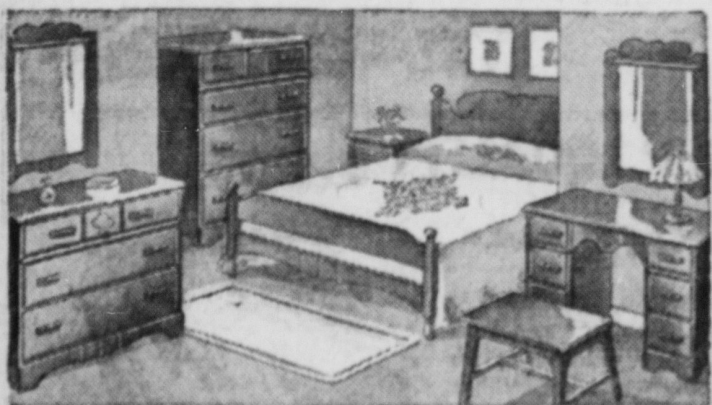
