Mrs. Emma V. Johnson, wife of Elmer E. Johnson, died at 3 o'clock Monday morning at the Altoona Mercy Hospital, where she was admitted July 8. She was born at Pleasant Gap, Centre county, April 20, 1865, a daughter of Andrew and Phoebe (Struble) Swartz, but had resided in Altoona for the past fifty-five years. She is survived by her husband, two sons, Fred R. Johnson, Altoona, and Carl W. Johnson, Los Angeles, Cal.; four grandchildren and one sister, Mrs. Robert Kline, Bellefonte. Mrs. Johnson was a member of the Second Lutheran church.

Mrs. Margaret L. Tate, of Salona, a native of Unionville, died at 2:40 a. m. Thursday, July 13, 1944, at her home after a long illness. She was born at Unionville, June 28, 1855, a daughter of Charles R. and Josephine Erhard Eckenroth and was aged 49 years and 14 days. Her husband, J. John Reed, Bellefonte restaurant owner, died at 2:15 p. m. Saturday, July 15, 1944, at Teah Private Hospital, Lock Haven, as the result of a heart attack suffered that morning at his home on Burrows street, Bellefonte. Mr. Reed was taken to the hospital in the Widdowson ambulance, being admitted to the institution about three hours before he died. He had conducted a restaurant here for 17 years, and was a charter member of the Eagles lodge of Bellefonte. Deceased was a son of William and Josephine Lockhard Reed and was born at Coleville 53 years ago. Surviving are his wife, the former Blanche Tierney; two daughters, Mrs. Harold Williams, of Bellefonte, and Miss Helen, at home; three grandchildren, and the following brothers and sisters: Mrs. Daisy Mills, of Tyrone; Mrs. Elizabeth Barner, of Altoona; George and Doris Reed, both of Bellefonte, and Mrs. Elmer Pownell, of Yac-

neil. Funeral services were held on Tuesday afternoon from the Widdowson funeral home on North Allegheny street, with Rev. G. E. Householder officiating. Interment was made in Centre County Memorial Park, near Shilloh.

Edward Franklin Dorman, of Snyderdowntown, died at 1 p. m. Thursday, July 13, 1944, at his home from complications following a five year illness. Mr. Dorman, who was employed for a number of years as a mechanic at the former Bezer Garage in Bellefonte, was aged 64 years, 4 months and 22 days. Born at Snyderdowntown, February 21, 1880, he was a son of John and Ellen Mooris Dorman. His wife, the former Ida M. Fisser, whom he married October 5, 1899, and two sons, survive. They are Milford Dorman, of Snyderdowntown, and Ralph E. Dorman, of Johnstown. Surviving brothers and sisters are: Arthur Dorman, of Altoona; Mrs. Annie Boyer, of Bellefonte; Mrs. Kathryn Hoy, of Pittsburgh; Mrs. Luther Unkle, of Lancaster, and John Dorman, of Mackeyville. He was a member of the Lutheran church of Snyderdowntown and the Odd Fellows lodge of Bellefonte. Funeral services were held at his late home Sunday afternoon, followed by services at the church. Rev. David Staesser officiated, and burial was made at Snyderdowntown.

Mrs. Edwin T. Davis died suddenly of a heart attack at her home in Morrisdale, Saturday night about 10:30 o'clock. She had been ill only about one half hour. Born at Gilestown eighty years ago, she was a daughter of John and Rebecca Cramer. Her husband preceded her in death in June, 1942. Nine children survive, namely: John M. William H. Dando, prominent Julian trucking business operator, died suddenly at 3:50 p. m. Thursday, July 13, 1944, while sitting in a chair on the porch of his home, Centre County Coroner Charles Shecker of Milesburg, said death was due to a heart attack. Mr. Dando had not been well since last December. Born at Frostburg, Md., October 10, 1893, a son of William and Rachael Hamilton Dando, he was aged 50 years, 9 months and 3 days. His mother, living at Frostburg; his wife, the former Hazel Beals, and two children survive. They are William Eugene Dando, in the Army stationed at Ft. McClellan, Ala.; and Gail E. Dando, of Shirelysburg. Two grandchildren, Gayle Ann, and Janet Ray, both at home, survive, in addition to the following sisters: Mrs. Letitia Conroy, of Eckhart, Md.; Lillian Dando, and Mrs. Mildred Evans, both of Frostburg, Md. Funeral services were held at his late home Monday afternoon, with Rev. O. Lee Gordon of Port Matilda, officiating. Interment was made in the Julian cemetery.
