1943, receiving his boot training at Great Lakes, Ill. From there he was sent to a gunnery school at Guilford, Miss., and subsequently underwent further training at Treasure Island, San Francisco, Cal. He was assigned to sea duty about 10 months ago. His last visit home was in August 1943, after completion of his boot training.

Before entering the service he was employed by the National Gypsum Company here. He attended the Bellefonte High School. Seaman Kuhn has two brothers and sisters, all residing in Bellefonte. They are: David, employed by the Sutton Engineering Company; Robert, at home, and Mrs. Joseph Allison, of Pike street.

The missing man is a nephew of Joseph Edward Caldwell, of Bellefonte, who as chief turret captain aboard one of the newest U. S. battle cruisers saw action in a number of major engagements in the South Pacific, and who is now serving aboard aircraft carriers in that area. He is a brother of Seaman Kuhn's mother.
