(Continued from page One) fonte, said in the letter written July 19, that he was "wounded, unable to walk, and won't be for some time."

The county soldier entered the service in February 1943. He was stationed at Atlantic City, N. J., Camp Carson, Colo., and at Camp Polk, La. He left for overseas duty on December 10, 1943.

Pvt. Solt attended the Axemann schools. For some time he was employed by the Shope Lumber Company, Bellefonte, and at the time of his induction, by the National Gypsum Company. While living in Bellefonte he made his home with the Charles L. Lose family.

A brother, Jacob C. Solt, 24, was injured while participating in the Italian invasion. He is now back with his unit serving with the infantry in Italy.
