amount asked of them." Commenting further, Mr. Aikens said: "We of the War Finance Committee began the 5th drive with some qualms, for never had the task seemed so impossible of achievement. It just didn't seem possible to sell more than two-and-a-quarter million dollars in bonds in the time allowed."

"Perhaps," he added, "that's why the drive was so successful. Everyone knew it would be a gigantic struggle to meet the quota, and everyone did everything possible to help! As head of the county unit I am profoundly grateful to all those who aided in keeping Centre county's record among the best in the state."

The 5th War Loan campaign, it is generally believed, will go down in history as the most ambitious

drive for funds in World War II. Quotas in future drives are not expected to be so large. That's why this county's success in topping the quota is considered so significant.

Mr. Aikens reported that virtually every one of the nine county districts topped their local quotas to contribute to the county total. All in all, the 5th drive is considered the most successful, from every standpoint, ever held in this county.

Officials are particularly enthusiastic over the record made in E bond sales. E bonds, the type sold generally to the small individual investor, are considered the major national bulwark against inflation.
