**Seriously Wounded**

1st Lt. Edward Drapcho, Lt. Drapcho, aged 24, son of Mr. and Mrs. Emro Drapcho, of Clarence, was seriously wounded in action in France on July 15, according to a War Department message received Monday by his parents.

The message did not come as a surprise to the parents, for they've had several letters from their son since he was wounded. He hasn't told them in his letters of his injuries, but said that he was in a hospital in England. The nature or extent of the wounds are unknown, but letters written in the hospital are in his own handwriting.

Lt. Drapcho, whose three brothers and one sister are all in the armed forces, entered the service in September 1942 and at New Cumberland was assigned to undergo training at Camp Wheeler, Ga. There he rapidly was promoted to his present rank of 1st Lieutenant. He was home on a furlough last November and returned to his duties a few days before Thanksgiving. He was sent overseas in December.

The Clarence infantry officer was graduated from high school in 1938 and was employed by the J. H. France refractories prior to entering the service. In his school days he was an outstanding football and basketball player.

It is believed that he was sent to France on D-Day or shortly thereafter. On June 16 he wrote to his parents from a foxhole on the Normandy beachhead, and wrote about every two days after that until the time he was wounded.

His brothers are: Pfc. Emro, with a medical unit, and Pvt. Cyril, in the infantry, both in France; and 2nd Lt. Joseph, with a tank unit in Hawaii, and a sister, Pfc. JoAnn, with the WAC at Zismarck, S. D.

**ESTABLISH NEW COMPLAINT RULE**

**Council Standardizes System; Saylor is Named Building Head**

To eliminate the possibility of error and to assure more prompt action on citizens' complaints, Bellefonte Council at a meeting Monday night ruled that in the future all complaints to Council must be presented in writing on a form provided by the borough, and must be signed by the complainant.

This step was taken upon the recommendation of Councilman Leslie Thomas, who declared the present system of orally reporting complaints often second hand, by the time they reach the Council chamber, could result in misunderstandings and might result in legal difficulties.

William W. Sieg, Council president, named Mr. Thomas, and Councilmen Russell Lambert and Walter Eberhart, together with Borough Manager Philip Saylor, to draw up a suitable form for complaints.

In accordance with the provisions of the new Borough Zoning Law, Mr. Sieg named Borough Manager Saylor as the borough building inspector. His duties will consist of general supervision over the administration of the law.

Council approved a request by the Bell Telephone Company for permission to extend an underground telephone cable on West Lamb street from a point near the Gamble Mill west to the borough line on Halfmoon Hill. The company has agreed to be responsible for any damage to streets or other borough property which may be caused during the construction of the line.

Walter Eberhart, chairman of the Special Committee in charge of line dust elimination, reported the executive group of the citizens' committee, of which he is chairman, also met July 9 and August 4, to discuss plans. Results of the meetings were not revealed.

The borough's radio interference elimination program is at a stalemate for the duration. It was reported, Ralph Myers, who some time ago was named and eliminated source of noise, reported that necessary filters for controlling interference are no longer available and that it is pointless to locate sources of noise if nothing can be done to remove them. As a result, Mr. Myers has withdrawn temporarily from his borough position, and in the future all radio complaints should be made to the borough offices. It was reported.

Council instructed its secretary to write a letter of appreciation and thanks to Arthur Boob, chief of the Logans, for his labor and initiative in equipping a 500-gallon emergency fire pump loaned the borough by the State Council of Defense with rubber-tired wheels so that it can be hauled readily from place to place. The pump is the property of the federal government. Mr. Boob it was reported, on his own initiative designed and constructed the carriage for the pump.

The Water Committee was instructed to formulate a plan for the collection of past due water accounts and to submit the plan at the next meeting of Council.

A shortage of water in the Burnside street area of town during the past week or so, it was reported, is due to the breakdown of a booster pump for that area. An emergency pump in operation hasn't sufficient capacity to deliver the volume of water needed. Efforts are being made to speed the repair of the regular pump.

The health officer's report, submitted by the Sanitary Committee, showed 24 health certificates issued, 10 eating places inspected and 7 nuisance complaints investigated. Four of the nuisances were abated. John Barnes, of Burnside street, is to be notified to discontinue use of a cesspool on his property and to connect with the borough sanitary sewers.

A report on the parking meter collections and payments to the meter company, revealed that only \$408.14 remains to be paid to the meter company. When that amount has been paid the meters will be borough property and all receipts from them will go into the borough treasury.

The police report submitted by Chief of Police Harry Dukeman showed 174 cars tagged for violations, 2 larceny investigations, 2 auto accident investigations, 2 disorderly conduct arrests, 2 transients lodged in the lockup, 2 stop sign violations, 3 traffic light violations, and \$327.57 collected from parking meters. Market fees totaled \$24.85.

Rev. G. E. Kelley, pastor of the Huntington U. B. church, will be in charge of the afternoon service at 2:30 p. m. and special music will include numbers by the Home-coming Choir and vocal solos by Mrs. Laura Roan, of East Bishop street, Bellefonte.

The Rev. Mr. Kelley also will be the speaker at the evening service at 7:30 o'clock. Music will be provided by the Home-coming Choir and the Church Choir.

The committee in charge of the program extends a cordial invitation to the public to attend any or all of the services. Meals will be provided by the ladies of the church.

**Prison Fugitives GET 6 TO 20 YEARS**

**Men Who Flew Rockview July 13, Sentenced; 3rd Apprehended**

Two prisoners who escaped from Rockview penitentiary on July 13 in a State-owned truck, were sentenced to serve 6 to 20 years for that offense when they appeared at a special session of court here yesterday morning.

The men, Floyd B. Goodwin and Kenneth Aldrich, were apprehended Monday in Maryland by members of the Maryland State Police and were returned immediately to Bellefonte upon instructions from C. C. Rhoads, deputy warden at Rockview. The truck in which they made their getaway from prison was found abandoned but in good condition along a rural road near Williamsburg two days after their escape.

Oddly enough, both men, although originally sentenced in different counties at different times, were serving 6 to 20 year terms for robbery when they escaped from the local institution, hence their penalty for that offense was the same.

For the larceny of the Rockview truck each man received a sentence of from 2 1/2 to 5 years, but that time is to run concurrently with the sentence for escaping.

Goodwin originally was sentenced from Fayette county and was transferred from the Western State Penitentiary at Pittsburgh to Rockview in September 1943. Aldrich was sentenced in Crawford county and went to Rockview in 1942.

Another Rockview escape was cleared up this week when Deputy Warden Rhoads reported that Steve Pushcar, who left the institution on April 20, has been apprehended in New York City. Pushcar is expected to be brought to Centre county for sentencing as soon as he is released by New York officials.

**Truck Overtaken**

A truck loaded with fruit upset on Route 220 about a mile and a half east of Julian early Saturday morning. Two cars were on the one-way strip and to avoid them the truck driver left the road.

**Pvt. Alfred Mann**

Pvt. Mann, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Mann, of Howard, R. D., was wounded in France on June 14 and is now undergoing treatment in a hospital in England.

Pvt. Mann entered the service on February 21, 1942, and was assigned to an infantry company. He received training at Dilworth, N. C. and elsewhere before being sent overseas.

**Council Increases Curb Market Fees**

Effective Saturday, August 12, dealers at Bellefonte's curb market on the diamond will be required to pay 35 cents to the borough each day they use market spaces, it was decided at a meeting of Council Monday night.

The fee at the present time is 20 cents, which, it was claimed, is insufficient in view of the general increase in the cost of borough services.
