OBITUARY

SARAH CATHERINE BROWN

Mrs. Sarah Catherine Brown, who died Thursday, August 3, 1944 at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Robert Wray, in Cleveland, Ohio, and whose remains were brought to Centre County for interment Saturday, August 5, was well known as a musician in Philadelphia and in Bellefonte before going to Cleveland 15 years ago. She was the widow of James Frederick Brown, a Civil War veteran and a building contractor for many years in Philadelphia. Mrs. Brown, who was 85 years of age, was born in Lewistown. Surviving are her daughter and two grandchildren, Miss Sarah Jane Wray, and Staff Sergeant R. W. Wray, Jr., now serving with the Army in New Jersey. The funeral services in the Bellefonte Presbyterian church were conducted by the Rev. William Thompson, and interment was made in Oak Ridge cemetery near Unionville.

MRS. REBECCA HEISER

Mrs. Rebecca (Gramley) Heiser, who formerly made her home with her daughter, Mrs. I. R. Stover, of Juniata, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Mayme Fort, at Wrightstown, N. J., August 5, 1944. A daughter of Philip and Catherine (Stover) Gramley, she was born at Rebersburg, Centre County, April 30, 1859, making her age 85 years, 3 months and 6 days, and was the last surviving member of that family. SPRING MILLS MAN MISSING IN ACTION

S Sgt. Harold R. Kennelley, of Spring Mills, has been missing in action over Germany since July 7, his mother, Mrs. Lillian Kennelley, was informed in a telegram received recently from the War Department. Sgt. Kennelley, a waist gunner and radio operator on a B-17 Flying Fortress, was on his 11th mission when he failed to return. His last letter received by his mother was dated June 3. The county sergeant was inducted into service on January 2, 1942. He took his basic training at Miami, Fla., and then was sent to a radio school at Sioux Falls, S. D. Later he went to a gunnery school at Laredo, Texas, then to Kerns, Utah, for special training. He returned to Sioux Falls and from there he was moved to an army base in Virginia from which point he left for overseas duty with the American Air Force in Italy. He landed in Italy some time in May. S Sgt. Kennelley is an only child. He attended the Gregg township schools and was graduated from Gregg Township Vocational School in 1940, where he was active in baseball, basketball, and soccer.
