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POULTRY CEILING PRICES LISTED

Wholesale, Retail Schedule Compiled by OPA Office

The Bellefonte Retail Board this week released a list of wholesale and retail ceiling prices on poultry for the Bellefonte area, as compiled by the Office of Price Administration in Williamsport.

In the following schedule the first price is the wholesale and the second price the retail: Broilers, fryers, under 4 lbs.; live weight, 30c-36c; dressed, 35c-44c; drawn, 44c-53c.

Stags and old roosters: live weight, 22c-26c; dressed, 25c-44c; drawn, 44c-53c.

Capons-heavy, over 6 lbs.; live weight, 33c-40c; dressed, 38c-47c; drawn, 46c-57c.

Cut-up poultry: wings, 29c-36c; legs, 61c-74c; breast, 61c-74c; neck, 13c-17c; liver, 65c-83c; gizzard or heart, 53c-65c.

1 1/2 per pound must be deducted if live poultry is purchased at the producer's place of business, or at auction.

If the gizzard is not cleaned by removing the contents and lining, the maximum base price shall be 1/2 of the maximum base price for gizzards listed in this table.

Dressed means killed, bled and plucked. Drawn means head, feet, entrails removed; gizzard cleaned—ready for the pan.

BORO. RULES "PAY OR NO WATER"

Service to be Discontinued if Delinquent Users Fail to Remit

The Water Committee of the Bellefonte Council has been instructed to turn-off water service, if necessary, to all properties in arrears on water rents, unless such arrearages are paid immediately.

This order was given at a regular meeting of Council, Monday night, when the committee reported only fair success in collecting delinquent accounts. Of a total of more than \$3,000 outstanding, a recent billing produced approximately \$631.02 in payments, it was reported.

Despite the present curtailment of aviation activities at the Bellefonte Airport, Council, looking to the post-war era, is continuing with its plan to expand and modernize the field. At Monday's session it was reported that lights, standards and fittings for boundary lights around the proposed extension of the airport have arrived and that installation will begin as soon as definite agreements with owners of the properties involved have been completed.

There are indications that the local airport may become the major Centre county air depot in a post-war world in which aviation is expected to play a much larger part than ever before. The local field has many natural advantages over other existing fields in the county, it was pointed out.

The police report, submitted by Chief Harry Dukeman, revealed 132 cars tagged for parking violations 1 larceny investigation, 1 arrest for disorderly conduct, 4 confidential reports, \$233 collected from meters, and \$30.90 from market fees.

Health Officer W. W. Buckett appeared in Council for advice in handling several matters pertaining to garbage and debris removal, and the matters were referred to the Sanitary and Street Committees. Mr. Buckett reported that he issued 8 health certificates, inspected 4 eating places and investigated 3 nuisance complaints.

The Logan Fire Company presented a check of \$20 received from Mrs. Joel C. Stover in appreciation of the services of the company at a fire at the Stover farm near Zion. As is customary in such cases, one-third of the amount was given the fire company and the remaining two-thirds is retained by the borough.

The borough roller was rented to the Susquehanna Paving Materials Company for a period of two weeks, at a weekly rental of \$75. The machine is to be used in Coalport. The company will furnish transportation, employ the regular operator of the roller, and will provide fuel and oil, in addition to the rental charge.

ORVISTON SOLDIER IS KILLED IN FRANCE

Pvt. Harry R. Rhoads, of Orviston, who would have been 20 in October, was killed in France on July 28, apparently in his second battle, as a letter, mailed to his father, August 1, four days after his death, said he had "gone through his first battle safely. There was no date on the enclosed message, and no explanation as to the circumstances of the mailing of this letter.

Harry is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Rhoads of Orviston, who received a War Department telegram on Thursday morning, August 17, telling of his death on July 28. A former employe of the General Refractories at Orviston, he was inducted on April 17, 1943, trained at Camp Blanding, Fla., and was stationed also at Little Rock, Ark., in Alabama, and at Fort Meade, Md., before being sent to England this spring.

He remained in England only a few weeks before seeing to France where he was serving as an infantryman. The youth was born in Orviston, Oct. 9, 1924, and attended the Orviston schools.

A brother, Cpl. Lester Rhoads, is stationed in Louisiana with the army. The brothers had not seen each other for a year and a half. Two sisters also survive. Mrs. Melvin McCloskey and Mrs. Robert Shearer, both of Orviston.
