State College Soldier Wounded in France

Pfc. William W. Johnston, of State College, was slightly wounded in action somewhere in France, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter D. Johnston, were informed in a telegram received last Thursday from the U. S. War Department.

Pfc. Johnston, who was 29 years old in February, was serving with an infantry division and had gone into France on D-Day. The last letter received from him by the Johnstons was one written on August 5 in which he said he was "getting along fine, am well and happy, and don't worry."

The young soldier attended the Pine Grove Mills schools and was employed as a butcher for Cooks Market, State College, at the time of his induction into the service.

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
