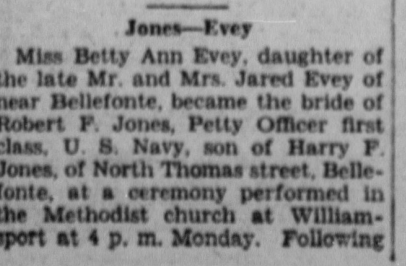
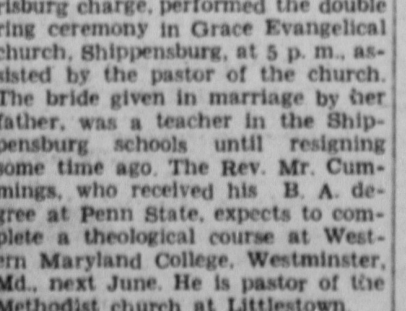
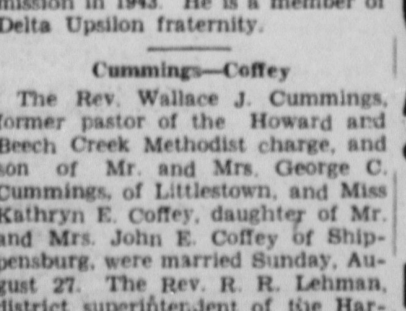
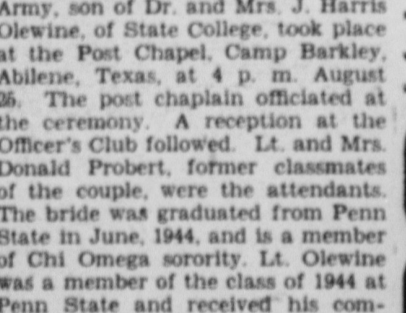
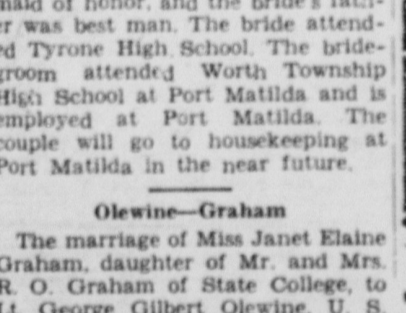
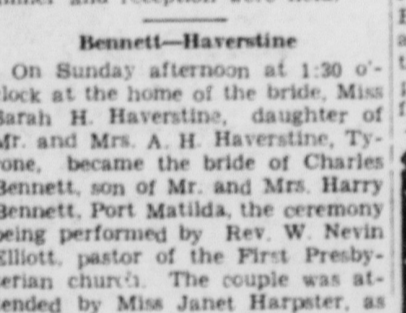
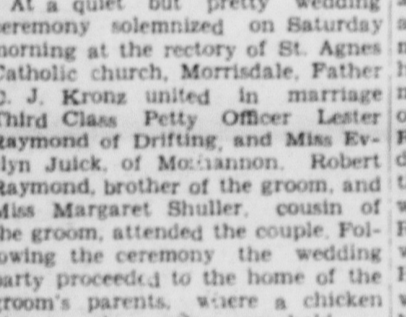
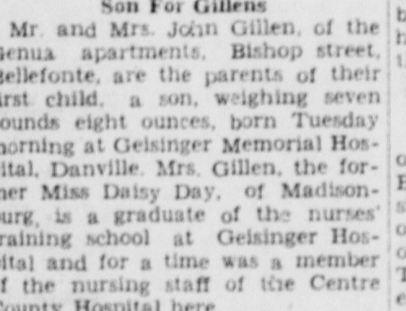
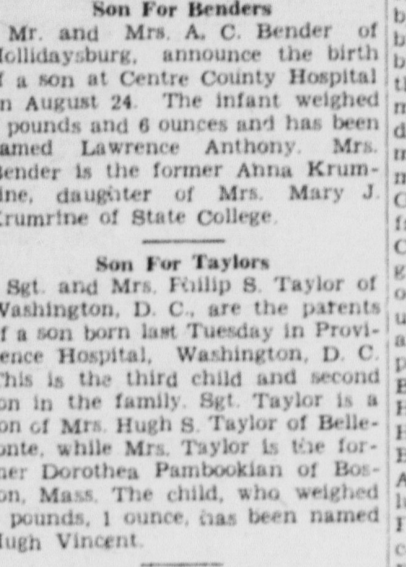
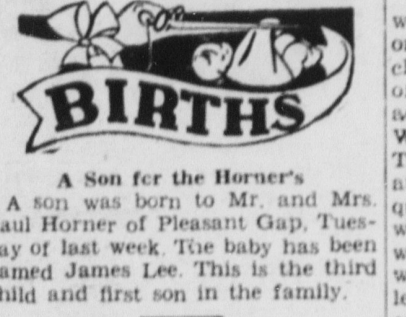
Cummings-Coffey
