NICK S. RILEY

Nick S. Riley, aged 56, for the past three years employed on the Peter Lyons farm at Lyons, east of Bellefonte, died at the Centre County Hospital at 12:10 a. m. Thursday, September 7, 1944, after a brief illness. Mr. Riley, who went to the Lyons home from Karthaus where he had been living with relatives, became ill about three weeks ago and apparently had recovered. Last Wednesday he was again stricken ill and was brought to the local hospital where he failed to respond to treatment. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Wash Riley. Funeral services were held Saturday at the Neff funeral home in Howard with Rev. Roy A. Goss officiating. Interment was made in the Schenck cemetery at Howard.

School Children To See Bloomsburg Fair

School children of Central Pennsylvania, more than 50,000 strong, will be entertained by the Bloomsburg Fair, held day and night from September 25 through 30. The fair association will see that the youngsters are admitted absolutely free, even paying the tax on their tickets.

School children of Columbia, Montour and Luzerne counties will be guests on Tuesday, September 27, and those of Luzerne, Lackawanna, Northumberland, Schuylkill, Snyder, Union, Lycoming, Sullivan, Lehigh and other counties on Friday, September 29. Many of the schools bring their bands and add much color to the exhibit. Tickets for the children are obtainable at any entrance on school days.

The livestock parade, the prize winning animals, always a feature at Bloomsburg Fair, will be held on Friday afternoon, September 29, on the race track. This always attracts the interest of thousands and comes after all of the "blue bloods" of the livestock realm have been judged. A magnet for interest during the judging is the cattle arena on the west end of the grounds where seating accommodations for 1,000 are provided. Judging of dairy and beef cattle is on from Tuesday through Thursday during the fair.

The entertainment features of Bloomsburg Fair are certain to establish a new high. There will be an elaborate night show each evening during the exhibition; horse racing from Tuesday through Friday; an automobile thrill show on Saturday afternoon, September 30, and eight acts of the world's best vaudeville with the races and thrill show during the afternoons and with the review at night. Two gigantic midways will be on either end of the Bloomsburg Fair grounds, of 114 acres, largest in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

The ship on which Cpl. Hoag was serving in the medical detachment, stopped in New Caledonia, at Fiji, and in the New Hebrides. On the return trip to the United States the ship, formerly a large liner, stopped at Guadalcanal where 500 casualties of the fighting on New Guinea, and Salpan were taken aboard to be brought to the United States for further treatment.

Cpl. Hoag explained that because there was little for a pharmacist to do aboard a ship, he aided other members of the ship's medical staff in caring for the 500 patients.

"That part of the world," Cpl. Hoag said in referring to the South Pacific, "is now comparatively safe. We saw no submarines, few evidences of enemy power, and escorts for faster ships are almost unnecessary."
