# Trail of Fugitive Lost At Martha

and just beyond the point where the State College cut-off joins the Bald Eagle Valley road.

The car was undamaged, but showed evidences of having been thoroughly ransacked. It is believed the thief abandoned the machine when he discovered the gasoline tank was nearly empty.

Cpl. Samuel Mullenkopf, in charge of the Rockview barracks of the State Police, who was a member of the searching party which combed the woods and fields near Martha late yesterday morning for the fugitive, on his return expressed belief that the man had boarded a freight train during the night or early yesterday morning. The highway from State College passes over the railroad tracks near the State House filling station, near Martha.

Loesch disappeared from Rockview while he was engaged in cutting corn on what is known as Corn Field No. 6 on the mountainside of the prison buildings. At 7:30 Tuesday morning he was said to have been seen walking along the railroad tracks near Linden Hall. When he left the institution he was wearing regulation prison garb. Prior to being assigned work in the fields about a month ago he had been working about the creamery.

His disappearance, Monday, was discovered quickly and in less than a half hour prison bloodhounds trailed him into the mountains, but acts of rain the trail was lost. The search continued through the night, and most of the searching units converged at Martha yesterday morning upon discovery of the Mayes car parked there.

Loesch, who was sentenced from Erie county, was serving 2½ to 5 years for burglary and receiving stolen goods. His minimum term would have expired on May 24, 1945. The fugitive, who is of medium stout build, is 5 feet, 6 inches tall, weighs 140 pounds, and has light blue eyes and brown hair.

# BELLEFONTE MAN GETS PURPLE HEART

Pvt. Lester Martin, 32, husband of the former Mary Emel, of North Penn street, and son of Mrs. Elby Martin of Pike street, both of Bellefonte, has been awarded the Purple Heart for slight wounds received in action in France.

In a letter received recently by his wife, Pvt. Martin, better known as "Pink," stated, "I guess I just happened to get too close to some shrapnel that was flying around and I got slightly nicked in the right side and doubt if I will ever have a scar."

Along with the Purple Heart he received the campaign bar with three stars for his part in the major battles in which he took part. His letter indicated he was sending the awards home.

The Bellefonte soldier who took part in the D-Day invasion of France and who was wounded in July, was called for service June 19, 1943, and trained with an amphibious engineering unit at Ft. Belvoir, Va., until being sent to Greenville, Pa., last November. The following month he was sent overseas as a member of Co. C, 3051 Engineers, landing in England.

He is a graduate of the Bellefonte High School where he was an outstanding football player. He was also a member of the "Governors," former independent Bellefonte football team. Before entering service he was employed at White Deer, near Williamsport. He has a brother, Cpl. Charles Martin, stationed at Camp Maxey, Texas.

# Centre in New District

District Manager Robert K. Morgan of the Altoona Office of Defense Transportation this week was advised of a realignment of the nine county area coming under his jurisdiction, by Regional Director Melvin R. Greene with headquarters in Philadelphia. Under the new set-up, the Altoona district will lose Clinton, Centre and Millin counties through their assignment to another district, and will take in Jefferson, Fulton and Indiana counties. The change will bring the Altoona ODT district area in conformity with that of the Altoona OPA district. It also authorizes the transfer on October 15th of a part of its commercial motor vehicle gasoline rationing functions to the Office of Price Administration.
