MAUDE MILLER CHOSEN CHAIRMAN

Will Fill Office Until Election by Democratic Party

Centre County Democrats named Miss Maude Miller of Ferguson township, County Chairman, to fill out the unexpired term of J. W. Kepler, who resigned, and set up a new system of choosing committees at a meeting of the county committee held on Sept. 1st.

Miss Miller, who is also county committee vice-chairman, will fill the dual role until 1946. Her election makes her the first woman to hold a major party county chairmanship in the state. It is believed under new by-laws, adopted by the county committee, precinct chairmen and vice-chairmen will be elected by the Democratic voters of their respective precincts. Formerly, they were appointed by the county chairman. They will be elected in the even-numbered years.

The county chairman and vice-chairman, instead of being balloted on at the primary, will be elected by the precinct chairmen and vice-chairmen. An executive board of five members will be chosen from five districts into which the county has been apportioned. Precinct chairmen and vice-chairmen from the precincts making up a district will name the district's executive board member. Candidates for district representative will be a precinct chairman or vice-chairman or any unattached Democrat.

The executive board will advise the county chairman and vice-chairman.

Milton Bradford of Centre Hall, was appointed by the county committee to serve as campaign chairman.

ground available it seemed to be the desirable place to hold them. The evergreen trees will be replaced as soon as others can be obtained.

An effort to create a game sanctuary one mile up and down Spring Creek from the Falls has been made in an effort to prevent the shooting of the ducks raised there. Many of the birds have migrated up and down stream and have fallen prey to hunters during the season. No reply has been received from the Commission as yet.

Henry Brockerhoff appeared before Council relative to a complaint filed with him relative to surface water on Cherry Alley between Allegheny and Spring streets. He offered to defray part of the expense of making a connection with the storm sewer running under the alley if in the opinion of the Borough Engineer that would solve the problem. The matter was left with the street committee with power to act.

Permission was given the Warner Company to erect two, directional signs, one at the corner of Lamb and Water streets and the other at the intersection of Lamb and Thomas streets. These will aid truckers to find the plant without going through town.

A spring on the east side of North Spring street near the High School building marked off for use by the school bus in loading and unloading. This move was made necessary because of the parking of private cars along the street preventing the bus from parking against the curb.

The oft repeated complaint about young people loitering on the streets was received again and the subject switched to the employment of an additional policeman. Council was in agreement that one man could not be everywhere but felt that the present police force could do a better job if they felt willing to. The hiring of an additional officer is out just now as it is impossible to obtain a special officer on Saturday evenings at the present time.

Fire Marshall Philip Saylor will plan some kind of program for the observance of Fire Prevention Week which falls on Monday. An effort will be made to inspect the main buildings in the center of town for fire hazards and to make a plea to all citizens to clean up their homes to prevent possible fires. The local fire record has been extremely fine and every effort will be made to keep it so.

Councilman Eberhart reported on his trip to Erie where he attended a hearing of the Public Service Commission relative to a petition by the BKS Flying Service for permission to operate several passenger routes in this section with Bellefonte one of the stops. Mr. Eberhart reported that the applicant was not in a position to operate the routes he asked for and that his application would no doubt be turned down.

Mr. Eberhart also reported that he and Councilman Smith had talked with officials of the Warner Company and had been told that the company was planning on the installation of a collector on the remaining stack and two companies.

Gregg Twp. Paper Collection Saturday

New 'A' Gasoline Books To Be Issued

The Basic A and D gasoline rationations will be renewed beginning October 16. Applications are now being distributed at the postoffices, gasoline stations and industrial plants in the Bellefonte district.

Applicants are instructed to complete new application, attach it to the back cover of the current A book and mail to the Local War Price and Rationing Board along with owner's card, on or after October 16. Applicants will retain the front cover of the current A book to which are attached the remaining A-1 and all A-12 coupons. The tire inspection record need not be submitted.

New A books will then be mailed to the applicant, also new mileage rationing record, for use beginning Nov. 9, 1944.

When the owner attempted to question Spicer, he got out of the machine and ran down Dunlap street towards the Swartz machine shop, where he was caught by State Police from Rockview barracks, who had already been notified.

Spicer was released on parole from Rockview penitentiary January 27 of this year after serving one-and-a-half years for burglary. He is being held for further investigation, county parole officers said.
