Governor's Home Once a Showplace

mer Governor Curtin mansion on West High street, now the Bellefonte Elks home.

The present owner of the Beaver home was born in the McAllister property about three years before the family moved into the house which went on the auction block, Saturday.

Few changes have been made in the Beaver mansion through the years. When Governor Beaver's term in office expired and he returned to Bellefonte from Harrisburg, he added a section on the Curtin street side to provide room for a library. Aside from that change, few alterations were made.

The house is of plastered brick construction with stone corner trimmings. In addition to its 21 rooms it has two baths, and some of the rooms are equipped with built-in individual washstands, with running hot and cold water. They are of a design long since passed into antiquity, but which were the last word in modernity at the time they were installed.

The first floor is notable for its hardwood floors and for its solid walnut wood trim. The windows and door sash are in natural finish solid walnut and probably could not be replaced at any price today. In the master bedroom on the second floor is a huge mirror set in a walnut frame resting on a low pedestal of walnut and marble. The top of the mirror and two windows at either side are set off with a carved walnut decoration somewhat on the order of present day valances. Tastefully designed fireplaces add a touch of "hominess" to many of the rooms.

The house has gone through different stages of heating. At one time, apparently, it was heated with a warm air system. Today a modern steam heating plant is used.

The lot on which the home is located is 209 by 290 feet in size and there is a two-story brick garage at the northwest corner. The property was occupied continuously by the Beaver family until a year or more ago when the personal property was disposed of and the Beavers moved to their country home on East Bishop street. The only other tenants of the house since Governor Beaver's time were the Joseph Baker family, who resided there until several months ago when they moved into an apartment.

While present plans for the disposal of the home are not definite, it is known to be for sale privately.

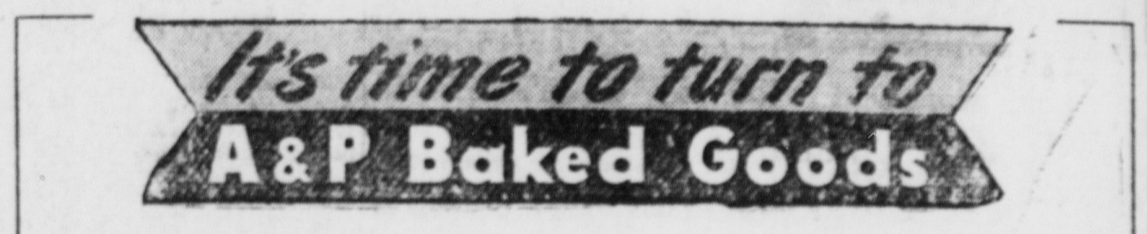
