MRS. HARRISON DUKEMAN

Mrs. Harrison Dukeman, of Clearfield, Spring Mills native, died at the Clearfield Hospital at 11:10 p. m. Friday, October 13, 1944, after a month's illness. She was 75. Born at Spring Mills, she was the former Molly Delinda Leitzell. Her husband, living in Clearfield, and two sisters survive. She was a sister-in-law of Chief of Police Harry Dukeman of Bellefonte. Mrs. Dukeman was admitted to the Centre County Hospital about a month ago but last Monday was taken to the Clearfield Hospital. Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon with Rev. Roy Goss officiating. Interment was made in the family plot in Curtin cemetery.

ANDREW GREELEY JORDON

Andrew Greeley Jordan died at his home near Colver at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning, October 17, 1944, after a several days' illness. He had been in failing health for several years. Mr. Jordan was a son of Andrew and Maria Bubb Jordan and was born in Potter township on September 7, 1872, making his age at time of death 72 years, 1 month and 10 days. Elmer E. Fye, a resident of North Bend for more than 50 years, died Sunday at his home. He had been ill for the past year and confined to bed the past two weeks. Born May 18, 1878 at Moshannon, he first came to North Bend as an employee of the Howard and Pearley Lumber Co. Later, after the lumber business was closed out, he conducted a general store. Forty-nine years ago he married Etta Galloway of North Bend, who survives him. Also surviving are two sons, Murriel Fye, of Farwell, and Albert, of Gleasonton; a brother, Norman, of Farwell; and a sister, Mrs. William Curry, of Moshannon; also six grandchildren. Funeral services were held Wednesday at Renovo and interment was made in the North Bend cemetery.

which are being so kindly complained of, profits are at an all-time high, and business failures are at an all-time low.

Francis J. Myers, candidate for U. S. Senator, spoke of the many benefits the farmers of the nation have derived during the Roosevelt administration and pointed to the co-operation with Britain and Russia in the conduct of the war as forming the foundations of a sound international confidence.

Bernard J. Clark, of Altoona, candidate for Congress from this district, and former Police Chief in Altoona, reviewed the accomplishments of the Roosevelt administration and gave a brief history of his own participation in politics as a lifelong member of the Democratic party.

Mr. Clark related that he was born in Hollidaysburg, learned the machinist's trade and went to work for the Pennsylvania Railroad in Altoona in 1887. In 1906 he was elected to the Board of Water Commissioners by Altoona City Council, and served when the board built Lake Altoona, source of the city's water supply. In 1908 he was appointed by the Mayor of Altoona as Chief of Police and after four years in that office resumed his work with the railroad, remaining with that company until his retirement.

During World War I he was named by Governor Brumbaugh to organize home defense units and completed the formation of 17 companies of defense police in Blair county.

Lowell Alexander, vice chairman of District No. 2, spoke of the representative turnout at the rally and urged his hearers to exert every effort to get out the vote on November 7.

The figures reveal that 1,826 new voters have been added to the registration list. The total registration in May was 29,004 and the present voting strength of Centre county is 21,830.

Council Aids Teen-Age Club

down by the State. The State's approval is necessary in order to obtain an allocation of \$500 in equipment for the rooms.

At the conclusion of a discussion of various possible sites, Council President W. W. Sieg instructed the Special Committee to meet with a Teen-Age Club delegation to inspect several locations, including the basement of the YMCA and the borough-owned Gamble Mill and Phoenix Mill properties. The meeting is to be held at 4 o'clock this Thursday afternoon.

Chief obstacles being met by the club are in finding a room large enough for dancing and other activities, with adequate floors, heat and light. The club also desires a place in which it can establish and enforce its own regulations without undue interference from others. It was explained that volunteer adult overseers will be present in the club rooms at all times.

The State Department of Health in a letter to Council declared that the State has no objection to the club provided the club meets State qualifications for the post and asked for action to clear the matter. The Sanitary Committee was instructed to investigate and to submit recommendations at the next meeting of Council.

Council passed on second reading a new parking ordinance to replace the one now in force. The new law will become effective upon final approval after the third reading scheduled for the regular meeting on November 6.

The new bill extends the restricted parking area to include Bishop street, from Allegheny to Penn streets; the south side of High street from Allegheny to the State theatre, and the north side of High street from Allegheny street to Decker alley.

No trucks may be parked in any of the restricted areas from 10 p. m. to 8 a. m. Business and professional people and others residing in Bellefonte may, for an annual fee of \$5 obtain special parking tags which will permit them to park in metered spaces for two-hour periods without using the meter and without incurring penalties. This is designed to meet the needs of those who use cars or trucks in their businesses or professions.

The long-standing problem of finding a suitable means of summing-up police officers at night was discussed and the Mayor and Fire and Police Committee were instructed to work out a standard system. Borough police have no headquarters and various officers have been left to make their own arrangements to receive calls at night-time, with the result that the public is at a loss to know how to summon police, and police have no standard or adequate way of receiving calls.

Chief Dukeman submitted a police report covering activities from October 2 to 16. The report showed 119 cars tagged for parking violations, 1 laundry investigation, 6 auto accident investigations, 1 arrest for drunkenness and disorderly conduct, 3 transcripts lodged in the borough lock-up, 9 confidential reports, \$329.67 parking meter collections and \$15.55 market fee collections.

Mrs. Robert M. Beach, on behalf of the Centre County Library, wrote to Council expressing appreciation for the \$250 appropriation to the library and asking that an increase be considered in preparing the budget for 1945.

The Civil Aeronautics Administration in Harrisburg in a letter to Council listed ten items of repair and maintenance which should be completed at the Bellefonte airport before the advent of winter. The letter was referred to Henry Noll, owner of the airport.

The Town Improvement committee reported that four blocks of paving along the creek on South Water street, and several blocks along the creek on North Water street, near the Titan bridge, are in dangerous condition. Temporary repairs were deemed unwise in view of the fact that the Highway Department is considering the widening of Water street as a post-war project.

The Sanitary Committee submitted

ted a report of Borough Health Officer W. W. Bickett showing 7 health certificates issued, and 5 eating and drinking places inspected. There were no communicable diseases. Borough Fire Marshal Philip Seylor reported that a fire inspection was conducted in the borough during Fire Prevention Week and that generally, business people and individuals are maintaining their properties in good condition, insuring far as fire hazards are concerned. Several dangerous conditions were ordered to be corrected, the Fire Marshal said.
