### Farm Question Box

Q.-What can be done about hog

cholera? A.... Have the veterinarian inoculate your pigs with the preventive when pigs are small. Use care in sanitation and in bringing in stock from the outside.

Q.-Why does a peach tree have gum around the base and on almost

all its peaches? -A.-The gum exuding from the trunk is probably due to peach tree borers; and that from the peaches due to curculio. Dig out the borers with a knife and a piece of wire, and spray early and often to control

Q.-Can cow itch be cured? A .- You should consult your veterinarian to determine first the cause and then the remedy. Most skin troubles will yield to applications of creosote stock dip, and touching the spots with strong io-

dine salve or bluestone solution. Q.-Why do pullets lay soft shell

A .- Soft-shelled and odd-shaped eggs are quite common at the beginning and end of a laying season because it takes a little time for the PARM MACHINERY - Parmall H various functions to become co-ordinated and working properly. A normal ration with shell and grit and some sunshine or vitamin D is quite desirable, but most pullets soon get to laying normal eggs and keep on till they get near the end of the laying period. The condition will correct itself.
