**Words Often Misused**  
Do not say, "Mary's solution was more perfect than yours." What is perfect cannot be more so. Though one may say, "Mary's solution was more nearly perfect than yours."  
Do not say, "I shall do it the same as I did before." Say, "Just as I did before."  
Do not say, "We generally attend church on Sunday." Say, "We usually attend church."  
Do not say, "I was balled up by so many questions." Say, "I was confused."  
Do not say, "He is a cunning child." Say, "an attractive child."  
Do not say, "They done the work thoroughly." Say, "They did the work," or, "They have done the work."

**Words Often Mispronounced**  
Area. Pronounce a-re-a, first a as in day, e as in me, second a as in ask, un-stressed, and accent first syllable.  
Fulcrum. Pronounce ful-krum, first u as in up, not as in full.  
Cicopatra. Pronounce kle-o-pi-tre, e as in me, o as in no, first a as in pay, second a as in ask, un-stressed, principal accent on third syllable.  
Memorable. Accent first syllable, not the second.  
Indicative. Pronounce in-dik-a-tiv, all i's as in it, and accent second syllable, not the first.  
Chapman. Pronounce the a as in ask, not as in at.

Aisle (passage): aisle (an island), Asphyxiate; observe the phyx, pronounced fox; Tomenau; two n's (pronounce tum-o, u as in up, o as in no).

accent last syllable. Punsilage; see not all. Disappoint; one s, two p's. Anonymous; observe the y.  
**Word Study**  
"Use a word three times and it is yours." Let us increase our vocabulary by mastering one word each day. Words for this lesson:

SEGREGATE (verb): to separate or cut off from others or from the main body. "The poorer class was segregated from the rich."  
SERENITY: quietness; stillness. "A general peace and serenely new life succeeded a general trouble."  
PRESICENT: having knowledge of coming events; foreseeing. "Henry had shown himself sensible, and almost presicent, of this event."
