# JUST TO KEEP THE RECORD STRAIGHT

It's queer what some editors seem to believe. The rich old "Plain Dealer" of Cleveland, explaining why it cannot support Roosevelt, although it has always professed to be an organ of Democracy, says; 'One of the blackest chapters in the history of the Roosevelt Administration is its labor record.

#### POLL OF WRITERS FAVORS ROOSEVELT A second poll of newspaper and radio corespondents accompanying

Gov. Thomas E. Dewey on his last campaign trip shows that 40 betieved President Roosevelt will be re-elected, 10 think the Republican candidate will win and one correspondent is undecided.

The poll was conducted by Columbia Broadcasting System. CBS made a similar poll last Sept. 27, at which time 35 members of the press party thought the President would win a fourth term, five thought Mr. Dewey would be elected and eight correspondents either were uncertain or declined to say.

Friday's poll also revealed that 28 of the newamen personally favored Gov. Dewey, 17 for Mr. Roosevelt, four were undecided and two wanted neither the Republican nor the Democratic candidate. In the first poll, 21 favored Mr. Roosevelt, 18 were for Gov. Dewey and nine were un-

Twenty-eight of those who participated in the first poll also took part in Friday's voting, with two having changed their minds since that time-one switching to Dewey and the other to support of the President.

#### CONTOUR STRIP FARMING AIDS YIELDS, FERTILITY

Effective contour strip farming increases yields and also saves water and fertility in the soil, points out County Agent R. C. Blaney as he urges more farmers to start planning to lay out the fields in time for next spring's plowing and planting.

The most productive layer of soil, found at the surface, is conserved by effective contouring. In drilling across a slope, small ridges and channels are formed over the entire surface, giving a corrugated effect with ridges slowing the flow of water and enabling the soil to absorb the moisture. This reduces the loss of water glycerine and rub it over the winand plant nutrients, as well as the dow-pane. This will keep the glass soil itself.
