An entire football team has been sent to Parris Island via the Marines by Penn State as the Marine unit established at the college 15 months ago was closed.

Thirteen members of Nittany's varsity squad, eight of whom played in Penn State's first three games were among the trainees assigned to the South Carolina base.

Dr. Carl P. Schott, dean of the school of physical education and athletics, commented yesterday: "Marine trainees have been in the majority on nearly all athletic squads since they came to the campus a year ago last July."

The trainees assigned to Parris Island and other stations, he added, included approximately 40 athletes whom he extolled for "their fine operation and helpful enthusiasm."

Only the Navy unit, with more than 30 trainees, still remains at Penn State.

UTILITY GRADE BEEF IS DELICIOUS FOOD

When other meats are scarce or high in point value, try utility grade beef, suggests Miss Helen S. Butler, home economics extension representative of Centre county. It is point free and is available in many markets.

Utility grade beef has little or no fat but it is just as nutritious as the better grades of meat though it is not so tender. One way to make the meat tender is to score it as for cube steaks, or chop or grind the meat. Slow cooking in a small amount of liquid that will provide steam will help to make the less tender cuts more tender.

To give the meat a good flavor and have a delicious brown gravy, brown the meat in fat. If desired, the meat may be rolled in flour before broiling. Simmer, do not boil, meat when cooking it on top of the stove. If cooking meat in the oven, cook it slowly until tender.

For delicious Swiss steak, have round steak cut one and a half to two inches thick. Roll the meat in flour seasoned with salt and pepper. Put drippings or other fat in a heavy skillet and brown the meat on all sides. Add one cup of canned tomatoes and cover tightly. Let simmer on top of the stove or cook in a slow oven, 300 degrees F., until tender. It will take about three hours for a 3-pound steak to cook tender. One hour before the meat is done, put a layer of sliced raw onions on top of the steak. If the liquid cooks away, add more tomatoes or hot water.

MAYONS NEED GENTLE HANDLING WHEN WASHED

Wash garments in soapsuds whenever possible as a good rule for keeping clothing clean these days, reminds Miss Helen S. Butler, home economics extension representative of Centre county. Dry cleaning not only is expensive but labor shortages and delivery problems delay the return of garments to their owners.

Many fabrics on the market today are washable, but it is wise to observe labels when buying either ready-to-wear clothing or yard goods. Facts in regard to methods of cleaning the fabric often are given on labels.

Be sure a fabric is washable before you attempt to wash it. If it can be washed, remove plastic buttons or other trimming and shoulder pads. Pads hold their shape better and prevent staining or seam marking the garment when ironed.

Many of the season's new fabrics are rayon. The important thing to remember in washing them is to work quickly. For best results, don't wait until a garment is too badly soiled before washing it. A large amount of mild soapsuds is essential for laundering rayons. Dissolve soap flakes in hot water, then add cold water until suds are lukewarm. Do not rub rayons and do not allow them to soap in the suds more than five minutes. Long soaking and hard rubbing weaken the fibers.

If the garment is badly soiled in spots, rub these spots with dry flakes before putting the entire garment in the suds. After washing rinse thoroughly and quickly at least twice in clear lukewarm water. Squeeze the garment to remove as much water as possible, then roll in a Turkish towel to take out excess moisture. When almost dry press on wrong side. Be sure the iron is the right temperature and not too hot.

DESTROY DISEASED PLANTS IN GARDEN

To avoid even more damage from disease next year, vegetable gardeners are reminded by County Agent Blaney to make a thorough cleanup of their garden plots.

Plant diseases live over winter, but there is less chance of their survival if diseased plants and weeds are destroyed by burning or plowing under.

Since plant diseases live and develop in compost piles, gardeners are warned against using diseased plants in the compost.

ANSWERS

URGES "RETOOLING" OF COMMUNITY "MACHINERY"

"Community Machinery"—those civic organizations which aim to perform some community service—will need to be retooled as much as industry for the war-to-peace conversion, is the suggestion of County Agent R. C. Blaney, for the guidance of many such groups in the different communities of Centre county.

The chief purpose of the existence of any organization is that it enables members to "do collectively what they can't do for themselves as individuals. The organization must produce something for which there is a real need."

Because fall is a time when many civic organizations reorganize for the ensuing year, now is a good time to do some definite planning for group activities during 1945, regardless of when the actual transition from war to peace may come.

These groups, to be effective, should emphasize attendance as an end of membership interest, study community needs with a view to meeting them, and stress participation in this program by the entire membership of the organization.

For additional suggestions on program making, particularly for groups in rural communities, officers can obtain copies of an outline "Attention to Possibilities in Program Planning" at the county agent's office.

ACROSS FROM GIBRALTAR STRAIT

Spain's slice of Morocco is about as big as Connecticut and New Hampshire combined, but only one-fifth of the area of French Morocco. The country fronts the Mediterranean for 200 miles, across Gibraltar strait, from Britain's great fortified rock and Spain. Outside the strait, it faces the Atlantic where its shore line dips southward 50 miles. The 225-square mile International Zone of Tangier is chipped off the northwestern corner.

Lighting-Promotions Dept.
Pfc. Robert A. d'Nivelle of Fort MacArthur, Calif., received one of the fastest promotions on record when he was recently upped from a mere private to a full-fledged colonel. Modestly, however, the private colonel continues to take orders from corporals and sergeants. His new title is "assistant Colonel," side-camp on the staff of the governor of New Mexico.

Meaning "Cucumber"
While the name of Sfax is traced to the Arabic "fakous," meaning "cucumber," the olive is the city's symbol today. The unbroken green of olive trees surrounds the port for 50 or 60 miles. The coastal plain known as the Sahel between Sfax and Sousse, 75 miles almost due north, is one of the richest olive-bearing regions of the Mediterranean.

An Old Fishing Town
Agadir, Morocco's southernmost port 25 miles south of Casablanca on the Atlantic, Agadir is an old fishing town with some 6,000 people. When Morocco was on the verge of submitting to France in 1911, Germany used Agadir as a base for organizing opposition, until bought off with Congo territory.

110,000 Lbs. Dehydrated Pork
A midwest packer was given a contract for 110,000 pounds of dehydrated pork for shipment overseas. The product is granular and is similar to brown sugar in color and texture. It has one-third the volume and one-fourth the weight of the meat from which it is produced.

Beans Are American
Beans are as American as apple pie and today it is doubly important to use them because they are low in cost and high in food value. (When combined or served with milk and eggs they may take the place of more costly meats.)

Pig Weight Gain
Pigs up to 50 pounds gain a pound of weight at one-half the cost of putting a pound of meat on a hog weighing between 300 and 350 pounds and at one-fourth the cost of a pound of gain on a 450-pound hog.

Car Sharing Saves Tires, Money
Five Chrysler employees, who have been car-sharing since 1937, found they saved 80 per cent of the cost of their 50-mile daily round trip to the plant. They saved money; the nation saved rubber.
