Miss Dunne portrays a small town mayoress who goes to a big town to engage a sculptor to make a statue of her dead husband. Boyer portrays the sculptor, who takes her to a night club where she is mistaken for a strip-tease artist and arrested. Released, she returns to her home town, hoping to escape scandal, but he, and ultimately the bad news, follow. Her step-daughter falls in love with the sculptor, and the step-daughter's boy friend falls in love with the mayoress, all of which makes for humor of fresh and extremely enjoyable kind.

The time of the story is the present, but there are no illusions to the war or other conditions of stress to impede the flow of merriment which sets in early and continues throughout.


