**Important to Social Security Holders**

John D. Teasdale, manager of the Williamsport office of the Social Security Board, this week explained the effect of the board's announcement that upon request it will recalculate the amount of old-age survivors insurance benefits available to once-retired workers to include credit for wages received since the benefits were first claimed.

"This action," Mr. Teasdale said, "is intended to take into account the fact that many workers past the age of 65, who have retired and drawn benefits, have come back to work since the country started its preparation for war. Originally, these workers, by filing a claim, set their benefits so that they could not be moved up or down. But they returned to work unexpectedly, and generally have received higher wages than before. The board has therefore announced that, in order to meet the intent of the law, their benefits may be recomputed in order to credit towards monthly retirement benefits the wages they received after they had once filed a claim."

Mr. Teasdale believed that a substantial number of workers, 65 or older, who have received some benefits under social security and have had their payments suspended due to their return to work, will benefit from the board's decision in the Williamsport area.

To prevent confusion or misunderstanding, Mr. Teasdale issued the following cautions:

- (1) Increased benefits will be available only to workers 65 or older, who have claimed benefits and who subsequently have worked in jobs covered by the Social Security Act, and generally at higher pay than their former average monthly wage. The benefit amounts of widows, orphans or aged parents whose benefits were based on wages up to the time of an insured worker's death, cannot be changed.

(2) Benefits will be re-calculated upon request of beneficiary.

(3) The announcement does not mean that any person may receive benefits while working in jobs covered by the law. The law provides that benefits must be suspended for any month in which the beneficiary makes more than \$14.99 on a covered job.

(4) There is no need for anybody who has been working in covered employment after he filed a claim to ask for a re-computation of his benefits as long as his pay stays as high as his average monthly wage between January 1, 1937, and the date he filed his claim. On the other hand, if his pay starts going down—as a result of illness, reduced hours, loss of his job or for any other reason—the worker who is 65 or older should consult the nearest office of the Social Security Board at once.

The Williamsport office of the Social Security Board is located in the Post Office Building.

In time, Mr. Teasdale pointed out, the new ruling will prove beneficial to many workers who attain age 65 and face the possibility that reduced pay, no matter what the cause, may result in reduced benefits. In the past, he said, some of these workers have chosen to "freeze" their benefit amounts by filing a claim, even though they intended to keep on working. That protected them against any drop in the benefit, but it also prevented any increase. The net effect is that the worker upon reaching 65, may "peg" his benefit so that it will not be reduced, but can be increased on the basis of his future work record.

CHURCHILL CHERISHED HIS 70TH BIRTHDAY

Winston Churchill, 70 years old last Thursday, was greeted with a roaring cheer when he entered the House of Commons to follow his usual custom of putting in a full day's work on his birthday.

"Seventy not out"—an extremely good score in cricket—was the personal greeting given the Prime Minister by 87-year-old Laborite Will Thorpe, the oldest member of Commons.

Churchill wore a deep red rose in his buttonhole and appeared in high good humor as various members came up to congratulate him.

**URGES FARMERS TO INVEST IN WAR BONDS**

Every Centre county farmer is urged by M. J. Grimes, agricultural deputy of the Pennsylvania War Finance Committee, to take advantage

of present favorable farm income and make an investment in war bonds that will do more to give his farm business permanent financial stability.

"The way farmers invest their wartime income will determine, to a

large extent, the prosperity of agriculture for the next generation,"

Grimes said. "It is seldom that farmers have an opportunity of investment like the present—one occasioned by the combination of favorable growing seasons and good

markets which have prevailed generally for the last three years.

"I feel sure that farmers will support the Sixth War Loan drive for purely patriotic reasons," said Mr. Grimes, who operates a farm near Catawissa, Columbia county. "But I

think farmers should also understand the part war bonds will play in winning the peace.

"There is no such thing as 'over-investing' in war bonds, Grimes added. If a financial emergency should arise, a person can always redeem

an E bond anytime 60 days after issue without any loss.
