At that time American Railway Express Company joined with the first group of transcontinental air lines to offer transcontinental air express. Today air express is handled by contract with 18 airlines serving 375 cities and towns having airports, and in 1943 handled over 11/2 million shipments weighing more than 31 million pounds. Airplanes specially designed for express and mail cargoes are now being used.


