3 Dead, 6 Wounded, 1 Missing in War

Pvt. Sayers Killed Pvt. Foster J. Sayers, 20, of Howard, who had never seen his four-months-old son, was killed in action in France on November 12, a War Department message received by his wife, the former Ellen Gardner, of Howard, reported Saturday.

Just two hours before she received the telegram conveying the news of her husband's death, she received a letter from the War Department saying that her husband had been "killed and that his body was buried in France." The telegram stated that a letter would follow and it is presumed that the letter, received about 3 p. m. was that letter.

The Howard soldier, who was called for service in March of last year, trained at Camp Polk, La., until being sent to an embarkation point late in the spring of this year. He then went overseas in May, landing in England and finally into France.

His infant son, Foster Joseph, Jr., was born August 7 of this year. Mrs. Sayers and her son live at the home of her mother, Mrs. Helen Gardner, of Howard.

Pfc. Woodring II, Killed Sunday, just five days after receiving a telegram reporting that her son, Pfc. Harry Woodring II, was missing in action in France, his mother, Mrs. Amy Woodring of State College, formerly of Port Matilda, received a War Department message announcing that he was killed in action in France on November 19.

Pfc. Woodring, who was 19 on November 23, enlisted in the service in August, 1942. He was assigned to the 100th Infantry and was sent overseas in April of this year. A brother, Lt. Charles E. Woodring, stationed at Columbia, S. C., where he is an instructor in navigation and bombardiering, and a sister, Marjorie, at home, survive.

Pfc. Houtz Wounded Pfc. Carl Houtz, 32, husband of the former Betty Emmlinger, of Willowbank street, Bellefonte, and son of Mrs. Martha Houtz, of Lemont, was slightly wounded on November 20 in France, according to a War Department telegram received by his wife last Thursday.

Pfc. Houtz, who was serving in the infantry, was called for service in April 1942, and took preliminary training at Ft. McClellan, Ala., and was then sent to Ft. Meade, Md. In October of the same year he was sent overseas, landing in Africa. Later he was sent into Italy and finally into France.

His wife and sons, Carl, Jr., 7, and Franklin, 3, live with Mrs. Houtz's mother, Mrs. Gertrude Emmlinger, of Willowbank street, Bellefonte.

Pfc. Barnet Wounded Pfc. William Thomas Barnet, Jr., 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. William T. Barnet, of Julian, was slightly wounded in France on November 26, his parents were informed in a War Department telegram last Thursday.

Pfc. Barnet was a member of an anti-tank infantry division and was called for service February 22, 1943. From New Cumberland he went to Tacoma, Wash., for training, and from there to Sturtevant, La. Later he was transferred to Camp Phillips, Kan., and in May of this year went overseas.

The Julian soldier attended Bellefonte High School and was employed for more than a year by the Warner Company before entering service. He has a brother, Marine Private Paul E. Barnet, now serving somewhere in the Pacific war theatre.

T/4 Homan Wounded T/4 Eugene S. Homan, 31, of State College, R. D., was slightly injured in Belgium on November 20, it was revealed in a War Department message received by his wife, Saturday morning.

In a letter received by Mrs. Homan last week her husband said that he was with the first Army in Belgium, and "you can figure out what I'm doing."

T/4 Homan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Waldo Homan of Boalsburg, enlisted in the service on December 10, 1942. He trained at Camp Van Dorn, Miss., and in September, 1943, was with on maneuvers to Louisiana. Following maneuvers he was sent to Camp Maxey, Texas, where he was stationed until going overseas about the first of October of this year. He landed in England and was then sent through France into Belgium.

The county soldier was graduated from the Harris Township High School in 1931 and attended Penn State. He played soccer in high school and was pitcher for Lemont and Boalsburg baseball teams. At the time of his enlistment he was employed by the Standard Floor Company of Pittsburgh.

Cpl. Krape Wounded

Tuesday night, just one day after they had received a letter from their son Cpl. Homer R. Krape, aged 24, informing them that he had been wounded in Germany, Mr. and Mrs. Boyd Krape, of Pleasant Gap received a War Department telegram reporting that he had been wounded slightly in Germany on November 26.

In the letter, Cpl. Krape said he had been wounded in the right hand and leg, and that the leg wound was the worst of the two. He said that he is in a hospital in Belgium.

Cpl. Krape, a graduate of the Bellefonte High School in the class of 1939, was employed by Stellard Belight, Pleasant Gap trucker, when he entered the service on April 25, 1942. He received his training at Camp Wheeler, Ga., and Camp Sutton, N. C., and was sent overseas in October 1942, landing in North Africa. He saw action in North Africa and in Sicily before being transferred to England. He participated in the invasion of France and has been in action ever since that time in France and Germany.

S/Sgt. Rogus Missing Staff Sergeant Paul Rogus, 24, son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Rogus, Sr., of Clarence, a waist-gunner on a B-29 Super Fortress is missing in action in the Atlantic war theatre, according to a War Department telegram received during the weekend by his parents.

Sgt. Rogus was with the first group of Super Fortresses to land in India. He enlisted in the Air Forces on November 10, 1942, and trained at Mission, Texas, Keeler Field, Miss., Lowry Field, Colo., and finally at the air base at Salina, Kan., before going overseas in April of this year.

The Clarence sergeant is a graduate of the 1939 class of the Snow Shoe High School and attended Penn State. Before entering service he was employed by the Packard Motor Car Company at Detroit, Mich.

Sgt. Rogus has a brother, Cpl. Edward Rogus, also in the Air Forces and stationed at an Army Air Base at Clovis, New Mexico. Another brother, Charles, was given an honorable medical discharge from service some time ago after six months' service.

He is a brother of Miss Helen Rogus, anesthesiologist at the Centre County Hospital in Bellefonte.

Missing Man Wounded Mrs. Samuel Richards, of Prossertown, who on November 10 received a message from the War Department announcing that her son, Pfc. James R. Richards, was missing in action in France since October 28, Sunday received a cablegram from the "missing" son, in which he indicates that he is in a hospital. The message read: "Anxiety unnecessary. I am in a hospital, getting along fine. Your son, Jim." The message gave no indication in what hospital nor in what country the county soldier is at the present time. He was a member of the 197th Infantry under General Patton. Pfc. Richards was called for service in April of last year and went overseas last July. His last letter to his parents written the day before he was reported missing and received November 5, stated that he got five "Jerries" and had a Jerry wrist watch. "I can't write much because I have to be on the lookout for the Germans," he said.
