Fire Destroys Big Barn at Centre Hall

(Continued from page one) later saw flames and smoke issuing from east corner of the building, on the west side of the barn floor. He ran to the house and told his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Weaver and their seven children took part in saving what they could from the building.

Attempts were made to call the Centre Hall Fire Company at once, but the telephone line was out of order, and approximately fifteen minutes elapsed before the firemen got to the scene. They made the fire run in quick time.

The fire was saved Robert Weaver, aged 12, suffered burns about the face as he led the calf safely from the barn. Robert received first aid treatment from Centre Hall firemen and the burns are not of a serious nature.

While much of the farm machinery was moved out of the building to a place of safety, a number of items including a measure, sprayer, summer mill, platform scales, battery brooder, milk cooler, forks, shovels, were lost. Lost also were large quantities of hay, corn fodder, straw, wheat, and oats. The corn was saved.

The cause of the fire has not been determined. No other loss in the barn floor since early this morning and while the barn was wired for electricity, the 33-volt house power plant has been out of operation and there was no current in the lines. Members of the family expressed a belief the fire may have originated from spontaneous combustion.

The Weavers have lived on the property for six years, and purchased the farm only a year ago from Mr. Weaver's father, Calvin Weaver. They were unable to estimate the loss, nor have they reached any decision on rebuilding the structure. The loss, it was said, is partly covered by insurance.

Members of the family gave full credit to Centre Hall firemen for saving the home and the important shed, as well as for keeping the loss to a minimum.
