Sunday School Lesson

THE BASIS OF COURAGE FOR THE FUTURE International Sunday School Lesson for December 31, 1944

GOLDEN TEXT: "Wherefore, my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, for as much as ye know that your labor is not vain in the Lord."—I Cor. 15: 58.

Lesson Text: Matthew 16: 13-20; II Peter 3: 14-18; I John 3: 1-3.

Our lesson for this last Sunday of 1944 is particularly fitting and a serious study of the scripture passages given for our consideration should lead the serious-thinking Christian to have a strong foundation for optimism in the future.

After teaching and healing in the region about the sea of Galilee, where the ever-present crowds prevented his having any quiet times with his disciples, Jesus started northward to be alone with them. As they reached the neighborhood of Caesarea, Philippi (now Banias), Jesus suddenly turned to his chosen followers and asked, "Who do men say that the Son of Man is?" Quickly the disciples answered that some thought him to be John the Baptist, some Elijah and yet others Jeremiah or some other prophet.

The people recognized in Jesus a very great teacher, one who spoke with authority, even with the authority of a prophet, but the people as a whole, had not yet recognized Jesus as the long-promised Messiah, although he fulfilled in every respect the prophecies concerning the Messiah.

Not satisfied with the answer of the disciples to his question, Jesus asked, "But who say ye that I am?" Surely, these men to whom he had been revealing himself by his words and deeds had learned the truth about him, Peter, the spokesman for the group, instantly and sincerely replied: "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God." How pleased, even thrilled must Jesus have been with this answer. The revelation of himself to his disciples had been understood by them.

This great confession of faith, expressed by Peter for himself and for the disciples, and expressed in word and deed by millions thereafter, is the foundation stone, the basic fact of the Lord's Messiahship. Jesus commended Peter in the following paraphrased words: "Your name is Peter, which signifies a stone, something hard, and this truth to which you have given expression is also something hard, a rock, and a rock is good for foundation work. I will build my church upon it. The community of my disciples shall be established on the truth of my Divine Sonship. And if this truth is in some point of view a foundation rock, it is from another, a key which will admit into the kingdom where I shall reign. You have the key, it was

(Continued from page One) ordered him to report to the hospital, where a check-up revealed he was suffering from Brail's Disease. His parents were notified of his condition and had been with him for ten days before his death.

Pvt. Eckley was born at Valley View on December 19, 1923, a son of Paul N. and Ethel King Eckley. Surviving are his parents and these brothers and sisters: Staff Sergeant Malcolm Eckley, of Atlantic City, N. J., and Julia, Peggy and Leroy, all at home.

He was a graduate of the Bellefonte High School in the class of 1941 and prior to entering the service was employed in the laboratories of the Titan Metal Company. He was a member of the United Brethren church at Valley View, the VFW, the American Legion Band and the former Banjo Band, all of Bellefonte.

Pvt. Eckley entered the service on January 19, 1943, and received training as a military police at Camp Gordon, Ga., and Camp Euston N. C., before being sent to Norfolk, Va., where he remained until June 23 of this year when he was sent overseas, landing in North Africa. After several months there he was sent to Italy, then Corsica, and his unit was in back of the first group of American paratroopers to land in France on D-Day, setting foot on French soil only 80 minutes after fighting began. He remained in France until returning to the United States in October.
