Machine Repair Course To Open
The purpose of the farm machinery repair program is to give farmers of Walker Township and adjoining areas a chance to repair their farm machinery in the evenings during the winter months. The light, heat, tools, garage space, equipment and instructor will be provided by the repair course. It will be under the supervision of Robert H. Corman and Leroy K. Pyle, of Millheim, will be the instructor. The course is responsible locally to the Walker township Board of Education and H. P. Bailey, supervising principal. Authorization for the operation of the course is provided by the Pennsylvania Production War Training Program...

Strip Mining To Be Regulated
Strip mining was ordered to be regulated by the Strip Mining Committee of the Joint State Government Commission at its final meeting. The legislation will provide that permits shall be obtained before a strip mining operation can be started and bonds must be filed to insure the compliance with the law and the rules and regulations of the Secretary of Mines are not complied with. The right of appeal is provided for to the local courts of common pleas. Penalties are provided for in the law in the event that the law and the rules and regulations of the Secretary of Mines are not complied with. Representative J. H. Wells, member of the committee, this week stated that the time has come when strip mining should be so conducted that the health, safety and general welfare of the public is protected and the land stripped should be improved so as to enhance the value of the land subjected to strip mining, prevent soil erosion and the accumulation of stagnant water, thereby reducing to a minimum the pollution of lakes, rivers and streams and bodies of water and to remove any detrimental effect such conditions would have on public health and safety, flood hazards or general hazards of pits and mounds. Such land should be restored to as much use and enjoyment as may be practicable.
