First Lt. C. Amelia Copenhaver daughter of Mrs. H. E. Faust, Potters Mills, and sister of R. B. Copenhaver of Bellefonte, is a member of the Army Nurse Corps serving with the 99th General Hospital, an advanced United States Army installation in the Oise Supply section of France. Recently this group of nurses were highly commended by their commanding officer, Col. Henry S. Murphy of Yeadon, Pa., who said:

"Those nurses have undergone many trying situations since we arrived in France, but always have been the most efficient and harmonious group I've ever seen in any hospital, military or civilian.

"The patients in the hospital have repeatedly spoken to me of the wonderful treatment they have received from these fine nurses. Not only have they worked nard in the care of patients, but when it was necessary to establish the hospital in record time for the reception of casualties, they voluntarily performed tasks of manual labor not ordinarily expected of nurses.

The hospital, one of the far hest forward of its kind in France, was erected and maintained for the residents of the French city by gifts from philanthropic Americans, in memory of U. S. soldiers who lost their lives in World War I.

The 99 is took over the hospital nine days after the Germans left, salvaging, restirilizing and putting to use everything possible that was left behind by the enemy.

Lt. Copenhaver is a graduate of righ School and Philipsburg State Hospital. She enlisted in one Army in May 1941. She went overseas in March 1944, was in England until August 1944, and then went to Normandy, her present location.
