"OLD PRICES AND HIGH WAGES"
While some business leaders are talking about post-war prices considerably higher than the pre-war era, Charles E. Wilson, president of the General Electric Company, announces that his company will sell its products at the old price. Mr. Wilson goes much further, declaring that restoration of the forty-hour week must not mean an abrupt drop in take-home pay. Industrialists, he thinks, must make sure that take-home pay, on a forty-hour basis, represents the higher level of earnings which now prevails, and that this can only be done by high production. The official points out that in 1929, "some fifteen billion dollars in income was shut off with the closing of plants and reductions in working hours. There were 100,000 bankruptcies and a forty-four per cent drop in industrial payrolls." Mr. Wilson adds that this can happen again "during the post-war period of readjustment unless there is a strong effort on the part of every business to hold down its prices, utilize its productive efficiency, cut its extravagant distribution costs and maintain its workers' income."
