STANDARDS OF THE KINGDOM
International Sunday School Lesson
for January 21, 1945

GOLDEN TEXT: "Blessed are they which are persecuted for righteousness sake: for theirs is the kingdom of heaven."—Matt. 5: 10.

Lesson Text: Matthew 5: 7-10, 43-48.

Three chapters in Matthew's gospel, in the form of a sermon by Jesus, make up what we know as the Sermon on the Mount. Our lessons for this and next week are based upon these three chapters.

While it is possible that this address may have been delivered at one time, the probability is that the author of Matthew's gospel collected extracts from numerous discourses, using them to make more complete the sermon delivered by Jesus to the Twelve immediately after they had been selected by him.

Matthew gives this sermon prominence at the beginning of his account of the Galilean ministry and it faithfully summarizes the teachings of the Master at this time.

The impression of the sermon has been profound and has greatly influenced the conduct of men. In it are to be found the principles of much wise legislation and the foundation for the rights of man.

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HEALTH & BEAUTY
THE FIRST DENTAL COLLEGE

The first dental college in the world was chartered in 1840, under the name which it still bears, the Baltimore College of Dental Surgery.

Back in 1840, it was difficult to obtain ideal surroundings for the teaching of anatomy. The young dental college housed its material and gave instruction in a secluded stable. Even then there were provokers who nosed into their affairs until wild reports became current.

In 1846 the College was removed to larger and more convenient quarters. Here the first dental infirmary was established. The faculty was wide awake and progressive. The courses of instruction were constantly improved, and became more thorough and the number of students increased as the reputation of the school continued to spread.

The Baltimore school has exerted a tremendous influence on dentistry. It has been the pattern of all other dental schools established throughout the country and has been the means of bringing about the superiority of the American dentist throughout the world.
