#### HEALTH & BEAUTY THE FIRST DENTAL COLLEGE

The first dental college in the world was chartered in 1840, under the name which it still bears, the Baltimore College of Dental Surgery. Five students were the first to enroll. Instructions began in the winter of 1840-41. The lectures were given in a small room at Hopkins Place near Baltimore street, which has been marked with a tablet as being the birthplace of dental education.

Back in 1840, it was difficult to obtain ideal surroundings for the teaching of anatomy. The young dental college housed its material and gave instruction in a secluded stable. Even then there were prowlers who nosed into their affairs until wild reports became current.

Then it took the faculty and all of the students to secure the release of the pris-

In 1846 the College was removed to larger and more convenient quarters. Here the first dental infirmary was established. The faculty was wide awake and progressive. The courses of instruction were constantly improved, and became more thorough and the number of students ncreased as the reputation of the chool continued to spread.
