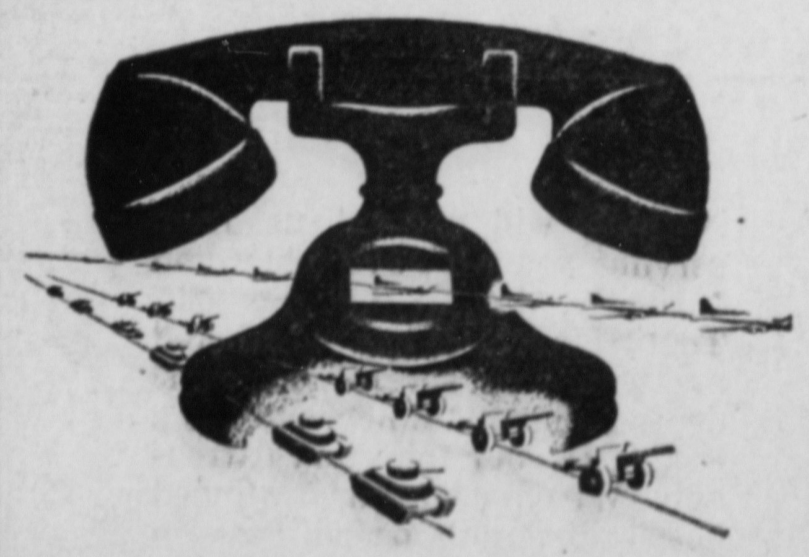

Explains New Draft Status Farm Workers

Recent Selective Service regulations call for physical examinations for farmers or farm men under 25 years of age. This will generally mean that the deferred classification, 2-C, will be changed to 1-A before a man is called to be examined. There has been no change in the right of any registrant to appeal his classification, but any appeal must be made to the draft board within ten days of the date the classification card was mailed, either by signing the Questionnaire form 40, or by letter. Action on any appeal will not be taken by draft boards until after the results of the examinations are known. History of farm operations and production will be important in determining the results of the appeals.
