March 3, 1944, and at New Cumberland was assigned to a tank corps and was sent to a camp in Kentucky. Late in the summer he spent a furlough at home and in August reported to Camp Chaffee, Ark., and later was assigned to Ft. Meade, Md. He went overseas in September, landing in England and being sent from there into France and Belgium.

Sgt. Hoy Wounded

Mr. and Mrs. Harvey S. Hoy, of Niagara Falls, N. Y., formerly of near Hubersburg, last Tuesday night received a War Department message notifying them that their son, Sgt. John H. Hoy, had been wounded in action in Belgium on Christmas Day. Last Thursday the parents received a short letter from their son in which he reported he had a compound fracture of the right leg and also was paralyzed. Sgt. Hoy said he was being moved to England for treatment. He didn't say where he was located when he wrote the letter but it was dated December 29, four days after he was wounded.

Pfc. Shoemaker Missing

Pfc. Irvin F. Shoemaker, 23, has been missing in action in Belgium since December 24, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Luther Shoemaker at Pleasant Gap, were informed in a War Department message received Tuesday. Pfc. Shoemaker, who was serving with the 630th Tank Destroyers, was called for service October 27, 1942, and first trained at Camp Hood, Texas. Later he was transferred to Camp Rucker, Ala., where he remained until being sent overseas early last June. He landed in France and went with his group into Normandy, across France into Belgium, and then into Germany. He is believed to have been among the first men to enter Germany and after fighting with the armed forces there went into Belgium. Two letters written in Luxembourg on December 15 were received

by his parents last Friday. The Pleasant Gap soldier is a graduate of the Spring Township High School and attended the Bellefonte High School. Before entering the service he was employed by the Markle Dairy, and later at the National Gypsum plant in Buffalo Run Valley.

while he was in a hospital in France, and in none of his letters did he reveal that he might be home. However, his arrival in Centre county was not a complete surprise, for relatives have not had any letters from him in recent weeks and they surmised that he might be at sea on his way to this country. He will be here for 30 days before reporting for a new assignment.

Pvt. Dando Wounded

Pvt. W. Eugene Dando, 37, son of Mrs. Hazel Dando, of Julian, was wounded in action in the European War theatre, it was disclosed in a letter he sent his mother and received during the weekend. The letter stated that he was wounded in the left arm and was hospitalized. He said he thought that by the time she received his letter he would be at a replacement center. He did not disclose in what country he was wounded or the extent of the injury. The Julian soldier, who was serving in the infantry with General Patton's Third Army, was called for service May 19, 1944. He first trained at Fort McClellan, Ala., and then was sent to Fort Meade, Md., where he remained until going overseas last November. In October he spent a 10-day furlough with his mother and other relatives.

T/S Egler Wounded

T/S Samuel M. Egler, who will be 30 years of age in May, was wounded in Belgium, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Miles Egler of 113 Heister street, State College, learned in a letter from a hospital in England on January 2. Technician Egler, who is married to the former Helen Ardery of Port Matilda, said he was hit in the thigh by shrapnel which came through to the inside of the leg. He said there were no bones broken and that he was getting along all right. He wrote that his wife and parents were not to worry about him, that the hospital personnel was wonderful and they were treating him fine. The State College soldier, who was with the Fourth Armored Division of Patton's Third Army, said he was taken by train to Paris and then by plane to England. Technician Egler entered the service in May, 1941, and trained at Pine Camp, N. Y., for 17 months. He was then sent to an armored school at Ft. Knox, Kentucky, followed by maneuvers in Tennessee and in California before going overseas around Christmas of 1943. His last furlough home was in September 1943. He was graduated from the Barnesboro High School and attended Penn State. At the time of entering the service he was working as a painter at Bethlehem Steel Company at Sparrow's Point, Md. Mrs. Egler is a teacher in the Pine Grove Mills school.

Harold Blazer Wounded

Harold LeRoy "Tiny" Blazer, 16, radarman, third class, was seriously wounded in action. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Francis Blazer, of South Barnard street, State College, were informed in a telegram received from the Navy Department last Wednesday.

County Blanketed By 7-inch Snow Fall

Snow fell to a depth of between six and seven inches Monday and Tuesday, adding to an accumulation which has been piling up in Centre County since the first major snow storm of the year on November 29, 1944. The woods and fields are covered to a depth of approximately two feet of snow and ice, and in some places drifts are six and seven feet in height. State Motor Police at Pleasant Gap yesterday reported that roads are in fair shape, and most roads, even the rural ones, are open to

traffic. The continued accumulation of snow brings increased possibility of a major flood in the event of a sudden thaw accompanied by rain.
