Fifty Years Ago

Pitcher George Hodson, formerly of Bellefonte, during the River league enthusiasm, has signed with the Boston National League baseball team for the season of 1935.

Mr. Landis, an old resident of Pottery Mills, was found dead in his bed on Monday morning of last week. His daughter had gone to his room to call him, and was astonished to find his spirit dead. His age was 82 years.

Since then he has been suffering severely from internal injuries.

On Monday the people of Zion were shocked to learn of the sudden death of William Shaffer at the home of Mr. J. A. Hoy, of that place. A paralytic stroke carried him off without warning of any kind. Deceased was about 74 years of age. He leaves to mourn his loss six children, his wife having preceded him to the grave 7 years ago. Interment occurred Wednesday at Zion.

On Tuesday evening the body of Daniel W. Hickey arrived in Bellefonte. The young man had been killed at Butte, Mont., last week by the explosion of a large quantity of dynamite stored in a building that took fire, and by which some forty others were killed. The deceased is a son of Thomas Hickey who for several years was engaged in this section as a railroad foreman. The mother accompanied the remains. The interment occurred on Wednesday in the Catholic cemetery.

Constantly on Allegheny street, from Valentine's Hill, is in Bellefonte and large crowds are out each evening.
