The national veterinary program, Dr. Thorpe declared, is divided into two principal branches; to protect the health of food producing animals, and to further the program for inspection of meats and milk.

In cities and in large meat packing centers, local, Federal and State governments oversee the inspection of meat and milk production, but in small communities, generally, no provisions are made for such inspection, the speaker said. Inspection is valuable not only be-

cause it prevents the spread of disease from animals to humans, but also because it is an important factor in keeping livestock healthy and disease free, he continued,

Before the program for the cradication of tuberculosis from cattle

was begun, he said, between 40,000 and 50,000 cattle were condemned each year because they were infected with that disease. In 1943, he said, less than 2,000 carcasses were condemned for that reason.

It requires six years of study in one of ten veterinary colleges in the United States before a person can qualify as a veterinarian today, the speaker said. "The day of the livery stable 'horse doctor' definitely is over!" he declared. In closing Dr. Thorpe said that as
