

ASK DAIRYMEN TO BOOST PRODUCTION

Steps Taken to Form Artificial Breeding Association in County

Centre county dairymen at their annual Dairy Day meeting in the Court House in Bellefonte on Friday of last week, took steps to form an artificial breeding cooperative association.

According to County Agent R. C. Blaney, over sixty dairymen owning 1200 cows, have signified their desire to become members of this new organization. Dairymen agree that this is an opportunity for them to improve the breeding in their dairy herds by establishing improved blood lines in their dairy cattle that will substantially increase milk production.

Prof. R. H. Olmstead, Dairy Extension Specialist of State College, told how the dairymen in all sections of Pennsylvania are planning these cooperative breeding organizations. He stated that it is an economical method of securing the use of good dairy sires with high producing ancestry. It will also make it unnecessary for dairymen to keep a herd sire of their own. Olmstead believes that this dairy improvement project will do more to improve the quality of the dairy cattle in Centre county than any other improvement program that dairymen have attempted.

Dr. Kenneth Hood, Agricultural Extension Economist of State College, discussed the dairy outlook and encouraged dairymen to produce all the milk they possibly could during the coming year, stating that the maximum production will not be able to supply the total need for dairy products. Hood, however, cautioned dairymen to only raise heifers from the better cows. He pointed out that the need for replacements in the European countries will not be as great as at one time anticipated. He believes that Centre county dairymen should maintain a balanced farm operation which might include poultry, or some other form of agricultural enterprise along with the dairy business. This will enable them to be in a better position to meet the unusual economic conditions which most people feel will follow the present war situation.



SCRAP COLLECTION HERE TOMORROW

Officials Hope For Large Collection of Cans to Complete Carload

Officials of the Bellefonte Salvage and Waste Committee yesterday reported that a townwide collection of tin cans, paper and rags will be held Friday, February 2, if the weather is favorable.

The collection will begin at 9 a. m. and borough trucks and employees will make the canvass throughout the town. In the event of snow or unsuitable weather, the collection will be held on Monday.

A special fee is made for a thorough roundup of all tin cans, since a carload is nearly ready for shipment and it is hoped that Friday's collection will complete the carload. Cans should be properly flattened, with labels removed, and should be placed in cartons for easy handling. All scrap should be placed in the curb in plain view of members of the truck crew. Paper and rags should be tied in bundles or packed in cartons.

Hospital Receives Iron Lung From Lodge

Through the generosity of the Bellefonte Moose Lodge, the Centre County Hospital is now equipped with a portable "iron lung," which is available for use anywhere in the county.

Presentation of the instrument by the Moose lodge to officials of the hospital was made at the high school auditorium last Thursday night. The presentation was made by William Litke, pastor governor of the lodge, and John G. Love, president of the hospital board, accepted it on behalf of the institution.

A demonstration of the use of the device was given by Harry G. Mann, a representative of the manufacturer.

The device is the most modern of its kind and is the only type used by the Army and Navy. It is completely portable and will operate on house current or on six-volt storage batteries. In emergencies the lung can be operated manually.

The person using the device can sit up or lie down, can read, has full use of both arms, and his head. He is enveloped only from the waist to the neck. The device is made of aluminum.

Designed primarily for treatment of polio victims, the device can be used with equal effectiveness in any emergency where artificial respiration is necessary. Members of local fire companies and first aid units in industries are being instructed in its use. The instrument was purchased by the lodge for the hospital so that it will be available to the citizens of Centre county without charge.

Local Brothers Home on Furlough

Friends of Pfc. Warren I. DeCoursey, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frederick DeCoursey, former Bellefonte residents, last week learned that the young soldier who had been wounded by artillery shrapnel through the abdomen, is now a patient in the Finney General Hospital, Thomasville, Ga.

Pfc. DeCoursey was in combat service with the 184th Co. Division, Company E. He was flown by plane from Naples, Italy, to Miami, Florida, and placed in the Coral Gables Regional Hospital No. 4. On January 13 he was transported by plane to the Finney General Hospital, which is considered the nearest hospital to take care of his type of case.

Pfc. DeCoursey has been awarded the Purple Heart.

Bellefonte Man Becomes Major

In a letter received Tuesday by his parents, Major Wilkinson said he was in command of a field artillery post and that while meals were served regularly and the food substantial, all the men were feeling the lack of adequate sleep.

At the time of his enlistment Major Wilkinson was a law partner of John G. Love of Bellefonte, the partnership having been formed in February 1940. Prior to that time he had served for several years as secretary to Judge Stern, of the Pennsylvania Supreme Court, having been appointed to that post shortly after completing his law studies.

Major Wilkinson has two brothers in the armed forces; Lt. (jg) James Wilkinson, who is believed to be aboard a minesweeper off the French coast, and Cpl. Robert Wilkinson, who is with the Air Force in Italy. Their father, Roy Wilkinson, Sr., is a veteran of the Spanish-American war.

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Missing Soldier Is Now Back in Action

Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Chaplain of Orriston, were notified in a telegram last Thursday that their son, Pfc. Edward Chaplain, 26, previously reported missing in action, had returned to active duty on January 4. The message stating that he was missing in action was received by the Chaplains on Saturday, January 20, and stated that he had been unreported in Belgium since January 2.

The Orriston soldier, who was serving his second enlistment in the Army, has been in service for six years. He is now serving with the 88th Engineers Battalion and has been overseas for six months. His first enlistment expired just a few days after Pearl Harbor.

Ten Citizens Selected to Gather Information in Centre County

Enumerators for the 1945 Farm Census in Centre county have been announced by Ramsey D. Kavanaugh, Supervisor of the Census in Lycoming, Clinton, Tioga, Potter, McKean, Cameron, Clearfield, Blair and Centre counties with headquarters in the county court house, Williamsport.

A farm census is taken every five years and this one is believed to be one of the most important ever taken in our country. It will cover crop production, live stock, machinery, and farm labor for the year 1944. A corps of 28,000 enumerators will work in the 48 states interviewing about 6,000,000 American farmers. The information concerning our agricultural activities will be assembled in the Bureau of Census in Washington and later will be made available to farm equipment manufacturers, public utility groups, and farm organizations in planning for the farms and their needs in the post war world.

Awarded Bronze Star for Heroism

Oliver S. Twist, 29-year-old son of Mrs. Oliver Twist, of Phillipsburg, has been awarded the Bronze Star Medal and promoted to the rank of Sergeant.

He was awarded the Bronze Star for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy in Normandy, France, on June 7. When the award was made he was a first class private.

Oliver is in an infantry regiment of the First Army. He entered the service on February 4, 1942, and went overseas two years ago in August.

Sergeant Twist went through the North African campaign, and the Sicilian and Italian campaigns before going to France. He had the distinction of capturing the first German prisoner during the Sicilian campaign.

He has three brothers in service. Sergeant Aaron is in the air force and is in the Philippines; Corporal Gordon is in the air force and is based in California, and James, a pharmacist's mate 2/c, is with the Navy on Saipan.
