Funeral services were held Saturday in Altoona for Harry A. Hutchison, 90, of Altoona, a native of Warriors Mark, who died Wednesday, January 24, 1945, in Elyria, Ohio. Mr. Hutchison, former Altoona business man, was born at Warriors Mark. His wife, Anna, preceded him in death. Two daughters and two brothers, including John Hutchison of Warriors Mark, survive.

She is survived by the following children: Katherine Hawkins, of Lake Wales, Fla.; Mrs. Nellie Kline, of State College, R. D.; Fred A. Roush, of Pleasant Gap; and Mrs. Ina McGlynn, of Altoona. She was a member of the Presbyterian church. Funeral services were held from the Koch funeral home, State College, Tuesday afternoon, with Rev. Donald G. Raup officiating. Interment was made in Pine Grove Mills.

**MISS MARY G. OLIVER**  
Miss Mary G. Oliver, of the Orlando apartments, State College, head teacher of the College Nursery School, died suddenly in Phillipsburg State Hospital early Saturday morning, January 27, 1945. Miss Oliver, who joined the staff of the Department of Home Economics on July 1, 1944, also had taught college classes in which she supervised the students' participation in the nursery school. Prior to her association with Penn State she had been connected with nursery school work at Purdue University; at a hospital at White Plains, N. Y.; Ohio University, and at the University of Iowa. She was graduated from the University of Cincinnati in 1930 and received her master's degree from Columbia University in 1933. Born in Kentucky on April 11, 1909, she was a daughter of Andrew J. and Florence Simon Oliver of Brookings, Ind., who survive with one sister, Mrs. J. D. Hull of Indianapolis, Ind. She was a member of the Presbyterian church. Brief funeral services were held at the Koch funeral home, State College, Monday afternoon, with Rev. W. N. Blair officiating. The body was taken to Indiana for interment.

**MRS. FRANCES EDDY ZIMMERMAN**  
Mrs. Frances Eddy Zimmerman, of Milesburg, in whose honor a Sunday school class at the Milesburg Methodist church, was named, died at her home at 6:45 p. m., Saturday, January 27, 1945, after a three weeks' illness. Mrs. Zimmerman was a daughter of Lyman T. and Margaret Walker Eddy and was born at Lamar on August 9, 1862, making her age at time of death 82 years, 4 months and 18 days. Her husband, Calvin, preceded her in death. Surviving children are: L. Eddy Zimmerman, of Bellefonte; Mrs. John Bryan, of Milesburg; and Malcolm Zimmerman, of Baltimore, Md. Also surviving are ten grandchildren and six great-grandchildren. Deceased was active in the work of the Methodist church, and was organist and a Sunday school teacher there for more than 50 years. She was a member of the W. S. C. S. Circle. The Mrs. Frances Eddy Zimmerman Sunday school class was named and chartered in her honor. Funeral services were held at the church, Tuesday afternoon with Rev. David A. Sower, Jr., and Rev. E. Foster Piper,

both of Milesburg, officiating. Interment was made in the Union cemetery, Bellefonte.

Ellis D. Snyder, former resident of Milesburg and native of Bellefonte, died yesterday morning, January 31, 1945, as the result of a stroke. He was a brother of the late Mrs. Emma Cooke and Miss Mollie Snyder, both of Bellefonte, and was born here on October 13, 1865, making his age at time of death 79 years, 3 months and 18 days. Funeral services will be held at 4 p. m. Friday at the Wetzel Memorial Chapel at Milesburg, with Rev. H. E. Oakwood, of Milesburg, officiating. Interment will be made in the Union cemetery, Bellefonte.

**MISS ANNIE OLLINGER**  
Miss Annie Ollinger, of Pittsburgh, native of Pine Glen and well known in the Snow Shoe area, died in Pittsburgh on Tuesday morning, January 30, 1945, at the age of 76 years. She was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Ollinger and was born in Pine Glen. She was the last member of her immediate family, and surviving relatives include an aunt, Mrs. Von B. Johnson, of Snow Shoe. Miss Ollinger spent the greater part of her life in Pine Glen and Grassflat, where she was employed as a dressmaker. Later she moved to Somerset county, and subsequently went to Pittsburgh to reside. Funeral services will be held at 10 a. m. Saturday at the Drifting Catholic church, with interment in the church cemetery. The body is now at the Von B. Johnson funeral home in Snow Shoe, where friends may call until the time of the funeral.

Mrs. Tena L. Brungart, of Rebersburg, died in the Lewistown General Hospital at 3:10 a. m. Sunday, January 29, 1945, of complications. She was 86. She was a member of the Rebersburg Lutheran church. Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon with Rev. James Shannon of Williamsport, officiating. Interment was made in the Rebersburg Lutheran Reformed cemetery.

Wilbert G. Rhoads, 51, of Coleville, died suddenly at 7:15 Monday morning, January 29, 1945, as the result of a heart attack he suffered shortly after reporting for work at the Sutton Engineering Company in Bellefonte. He was taken in the Widows' ambulance to the Centre County Hospital where he was pronounced dead on arrival. Mr. Rhoads had returned to his work only a few days earlier after being confined to his home because of an attack of bronchitis. He had been an employee of the Sutton company since December 22, 1942. A son of George and Esther Purdie Rhoads, he was born at Coleville on September 6, 1893. Surviving are his wife, the former Madeline Downing, and these children: George, of Coleville; Franklin, Mrs. Edward Kern, of Bellefonte; Mrs. Paul McKinley, of Howard; Staff Sergeant Robert C. now a prisoner of war in Germany; and Sarah, Esther, Dale, Madeline and Alma, all at home. Also surviving

are a brother, Lee Rhoads, of Coleville, and nine grandchildren. Deceased was a member of the Bellefonte United Brethren church. Funeral services will be held at 2:30 o'clock Friday afternoon at the home, with Rev. E. E. Crimton, pastor of the local U. B. church, officiating. Interment will be made in the Union cemetery, Bellefonte.

William H. Sampel, 83, former employe of the W. H. Carnegie Co. in Pittsburgh, was found dead in bed at 6:45 a. m. yesterday, January 31, 1945, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ell House, East High street, Bellefonte, where he resided. He is believed to have died of a heart attack about 6 a. m., according to a report by County Coroner Charles Shecker of Milesburg. Mr. Sampel was born at Axe Mann. His wife, the former Annie Gettig, died about six years ago. Surviving are several brothers and sisters, including Boyd Sampel, of near the airport. Mr. Sampel retired from active life about 18 years ago. Funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon at the House home here, with Rev. Harry C. Stenger, Jr., of the Bellefonte Methodist church, officiating. Interment will be made in the Pleasant Gap cemetery.

reached the vicinity of Rockview penitentiary. There, while plowing through a drift their car and one of the Samuel Poorman taxis from Bellefonte, which was traveling toward State College, collided. Damage was slight, but the cars were snowbound. Campbell and Scott stood around for a time until a mail truck driven by Frank Prestipino, of Phillipsburg, approached from the direction of State College. Frank stopped and the two stranded motorists accepted his invitation to ride into Bellefonte.

They set out in the truck, and had no more than got under way until the truck collided with a sedan driven by Dr. Richard P. Noll, Bellefonte dentist, who was enroute to Rockview penitentiary where he is the prison dentist. The truck was put out of commission and Dr. Noll's car also was badly damaged. This accident happened near the Rockview school.

Campbell and Scott once more found themselves stranded in the cold and snow, and as they shivered and debated what to do next, Kyle Alexander, of State College, manager of the Farm Security office in

Bellefonte, came along on his way to work. Alexander invited them to ride with him, and it seemed their troubles were over. All went well until the car ran out of gasoline while coming in South Water street. Campbell and Scott, whose remarks at this point unfortunately were not preserved for posterity, got out in the snow and cold once again. Convinced that it was not their lucky day, they waved aside an offer of a lift into the business district of town, and having a zero breeze, hired the remainder of the way into their respective offices.

**Reported Missing in Action**  
Sgt. G. Robert Pierson, son-in-law of Mrs. Mary Lupton of Phillipsburg, is reported missing in action over Germany. Sergeant Pierson lived at Pontiac, Mich., and is married to the former Helen Lupton. They have a son, Claude Lee, who is two years old. It is known that he had completed at least 11 missions as a crew member aboard a B-17 Flying Fortress. He was with the Eighth Air Force and was listed as missing on December 31.

**Reported Dead of Wounds, Still Living**  
S/Sgt. Joseph Krupa, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Krupa, of North Phillipsburg, is very much alive in spite of the fact that he was reported killed in action last fall in Germany. The Phillipsburg soldier was wounded in the head and arm and is suffering from shellshock. He is now hospitalized in Washington, D. C., and three family members have just returned from there after having visited with him for several days.

They say that he looks fine and that his wounds are healing nicely and that he seems to be recovering slowly from his shellshock. His brother, Steve, of Troy, and sister, Catherine, and aunt, Miss Kathryn Krupa, both of North Phillipsburg, visited with him. It is the first that any member of the family had seen him since he was home three days before going overseas. He was returned to a hospital in this country in December.

Krupa served in the armored infantry and participated in the invasion of France. The family was first notified that he had been seriously wounded. Second, they received word that he had died of his wounds. Third, three

weeks later, word was received that he had been seriously wounded in action but had not died and that an error had been made.

way traffic. Highway Department officials here said that because of the unusual depth and weight of the snow, breakdowns in equipment are more frequent than ordinary, and scarcity of repair parts often causes considerable delay in getting the equipment back into service. Many farmers and others residing in rural areas have been "snowed in" for weeks. Typical of many of them is that of a farmer near Spring Mills, who has been unable to drive from his farm for nearly a month. When he leaves home he is forced to walk three miles through the snow to reach transportation facilities. Railroads, too, have been experiencing much difficulty. The Pennsylvania Railroad, using two locomotives attached to a snow plow, last week opened up the Lewisburg and Tyrone branch, where drifts were particularly heavy in the vicinity of Centre Hall. Subsequent snowfall and wind, however, soon closed the road in many places, and

plows were being used again yesterday. The train from Sunbury, due here at 9:35 a. m. yesterday, didn't arrive in Bellefonte until nearly 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The Snow Shoe freight stalled at the Sunville school house on an attempted trip to Snow Shoe one day last week, but yesterday the road was open, although officials feared high winds would soon block that route.

The Bellefonte Central Railroad, which operates between Bellefonte and State College, has been having much difficulty. The right-of-way along the golf course just west of the State College station is subject to heavy drifting, and for a number of days crews have been working to keep that section open. One cut has been opened so many times with a plow that the cut is full and there's no place for the plow to push additional drifts. In this cut, snow drifts to a depth of six to seven feet and is packed so tightly that a man can walk on the surface. Much hand shoveling has been necessary to keep the line open.
