## WARREN S. KRISSE

Warren S. Krisse, 75, widely known alderman and insurance agent of Johnstown, died at his home in that city after an illness which began last March. A native of Johnstown, he was born on March 2, 1869, a son of Prof. William A. and Nancy (Hunt) Krisse. Surviving are his widow, the former Ella Hammer, and seven children. He also leaves two sisters: Mrs. Lillian Slick, Struthers, Ohio, and Mrs. Elsie Reish, Lewisport. Mr. Krisse was prominent in Democratic politics, and had formerly served as a vital statistician in Johnstown. He was a 32nd degree Mason and a member of the Williamsport Consistory and other Masonic groups. Mr. Krisse was well known in Centre county.

## Snow, Ice Cause Auto Accidents

figured in a mishap on route 220 between Julian and Unionville about 3:45 p. m. last Thursday. No one was injured and damage was about \$125. Mr. Olney is said to have lost control of his car, which swung to the left, swerved back into a snow pile, struck a mail box and finally hit the Plick car which was parked in front of the Plick garage. Both machines were damaged. The accident was investigated by State Police from Pleasant Gap. A sedan operated by Lester Corman, of Beech Creek, R. D., and a car driven by Sara B. Bierly, of Jersey Shore, sideswiped on Main street, Howard, at about 6:45 p. m. Friday.

The two machines are reported to have been traveling in opposite directions and met as they passed opposite a car parked on the icy road which was narrow at that point. State Police from Pleasant Gap substitution said. Five persons were in the Bierly machine, while Mr. Corman was unaccompanied. No one was injured. Damage to Bierly's car was estimated at \$75 and to the other car about \$40.

State College motorists had difficulties last Wednesday when four accidents involving eight cars were reported in the borough between the hours of 10 a. m. and 4:30 p. m. No one was injured but total damage to the machines was approximately \$150. Chief of Police John R. Juba who investigated the accidents, reported.

The first accident happened in the 100 block of South Allen street at 10 a. m., when a truck driven by Harry Falk of West Nittany avenue, skidded and hit a car parked in front of the G. C. Murphy Company store. Damage was light to both machines.

At 1:45 p. m., in the 600 block of West College avenue, cars driven by Mrs. Louise J. Schmidt of State College, R. D., and James Sprankle, of East College avenue, sideswiped, causing about \$5 damage to both cars. The accident happened when Mrs. Schmidt, who was traveling east, swung out to avoid hitting a deep rut, as Mr. Sprankle, driving west, applied brakes, causing his machine to skid.

The third accident occurred in the 300 block of South Allen street about 2 p. m. when Betty J. Krumrine, of West College avenue, driving a College truck and traveling north, attempted to pass a parked car and skidded as she turned to the center of the street. Her machine collided with a car traveling in the opposite direction driven by Specialist Van Allen Hartman of East Irwin avenue. The accident caused \$125 damage amounting to approximately \$15.

The other accident happened in the 300 block of South Atherton street at 4:30 p. m., when a car driven by Dean B. Ewag of Altoona, and going north, went into a skid and as the driver lost control of the machine it crossed the street and collided with a parked car owned by Robert C. Myers of South Atherton street. The accident caused about \$125 total damage, Chief Juba said.
